Notice is hereby given that J. J. Mercer, whose post office address is American Fork, Utah, has made application in accordance with the requirements of Chapter 108, Session Laws of Utah, 1905, as amended by the Session Laws of Utah, 1907, to appropriate forty (40) cubic-feet per second of water from American Fork Canyon Creek, Utah County, Utah. Said water will be diverted at a point which lies 100 feet south of the confluence of Deer Creek and American Fork Creek, at a point where a conglomerate rock extends down to said stream, from where it will be diverted by means of a pipe line for a distance of 12,000 feet and there used from January 1 to December 31, inclusive, of each year, to develop power for the purpose of electric lighting and propelling machinery at various cities and towns in the State of Utah. After having been so diverted and used, the water will be returned to the natural channel of said stream, at the confluence of the South Fork in American Fork Canyon and the main stream. This application is designated in the State Engineer's office as No. 1857.
