

Fine Program Arranged for the Day.

WILL HAVE BIG PARADE.

Big Meeting in the Tabernacle,--Will spend the Day at Saratoga Springs.

Lehi will celebrate Pioneer day in old time style, with serenades, meetings, parades, and in the afternoon, all the citizens will go over to the Saratoga Springs, where all sorts of games and sports will be indulged in.

At day break there will be a salute of fifteen guns in honor of the presidency and twelve apostles.

At sunrise the serenading of the city by the three bands, will commence and the marshal of the day, James N. Gardner, will unfurl Old Glory from the liberty pole.

At 8:30 the city bell will commence ringing as a signal for the parade to form, and at 9 o'clock the parade will commence to move.

MANY ACCIDENTS.

Carl Hartell Shoots Himself.

AT SARATOGA SPRINGS.

Boy run over by a Wagon at Lehi Junction, Child Takes Carbonic Acid.

What came near resulting in a fatal accident happened at the Saratoga Springs about 8 o'clock Sunday morning. Carl Hartell, an employe at the springs was out shooting birds with a 22-caliber revolver. He had fired once, and in an effort to fire the second time the hammer caught. While endeavoring to get it loose the gun was discharged, and as the muzzle was held next to his abdomen the ball entered his body just below the naval and passed round nearly to the left side. Dr. Steele, who was hastily summoned from Lehi, soon extracted the ball, and declared that the injury was not serious, and would only result in the loss of a few days' work.

Mr. Hartell, at first, did not think his injury was deserving of much attention, as he walked to the house and was seated at the breakfast table, when he became weak and fainted away, whereupon one of his fellow workmen, hastened to Lehi and summoned Dr. Steele, and, as above stated, the ball was extracted and the patient pronounced out of danger.

Run over by a Wagon.

Another sad accident occurred at Lehi Junction last Saturday. A little son of Steve Winn climbed onto Hyrum Kirkham's wagon, and although being put off by the gentleman and warned not to get on again, he persisted that he would have a ride, and mounted the brake-block, when the team started up the hill. Under the wheel which passed over his foot and terribly mangled that member.

Child Takes Poison.

Another of those dreadful accidents that are becoming very common in the community occurred at Lehi Junction Sunday. This time it is the little 3-year old son of J. D. Camp, who got hold of a bottle of carbonic acid and took the contents. The child was terribly burnt and his recovery is very doubtful.

Went to Jail.

Two small sized boys were up before Justice Woodhouse Tuesday morning to answer to the charge of fast driving on the streets.

They both pled guilty and were fined the large amount of 50c. They failed to dig up and were ordered locked up in jail for 12 hours. Some few minutes after they were turned loose, the result of having the fine paid by friends.

How Fortune Smiled.

When this incident occurred, as related by a Detroit lawyer, he was 30 years younger than he is now:

I told 'em what a lot of jays they was to blow their stuff in on big wigs that charged a dollar for every word they spoke. My plan was to buy witnesses, and then any fool of a lawyer would do us. That's how you got the case and it saved us a pile."
