Pavement Likely to Be Turned Down

It is predicted that Main Street property owners will turn down the creating of a paving district on Main Street when they meet this evening. Much dissension has arisen just recently on the matter of the width of the proposed street pavement. At first it was understood and advocated that the cement be from sidewalk to sidewalk but, for the reason of cheapening the cost and because of the city water mains being of wood necessitating their removal and the installation of permanent iron pipe the "intention to create the district" as published by the city provides for only a 36 foot cement road including the curbing. This would leave a strip about 4 1/2 feet unpaved between the road and sidewalk on each side. It is contended that if this idea were followed the parking of two cars, one on either side of the street opposite one another, would leave barely enough room for a third car to drive between. With this objection and the opposition expected on the street, there seems little chance of the issue going through.

DECLINE IN SUGAR PRICE PREDICTED

The break in the raw sugar market in New York last week presages an inevitable further decline in the price of refined sugar in the intermountain region, according to one of the best informed men in sugar circles. Raw prices dropped to 14 cents a pound for prompt delivery and 13 cents for future delivery in New York yesterday. Allowing for the difference between raw and refined prices of from 3 to 4 cents this would bring 17 to 18 cents as the price for the refined product within the next fortnight.

LARSEN BROS. TO CLOSE ONE STORE

The Larsen Brothers, operators of the two meat markets and grocery stores on State and Main streets, have decided to discontinue the operation of the State Street business and are making a public announcement in this issue of the same.

The operators of the stores have come to the conclusion that it will be best to unite their efforts at one business place. They contend that they will be better able to serve their customers as it will be easier to tend to the small details that go so far in the proper operation of a public institution.

The company has always enjoyed a business since their first opening, gradually building up until now they crush the entire town with meats, a portion with groceries and besides maintain a wholesale trade to the surrounding rock quarries and mining camps.

In discussing the change the others expressed the belief that under closer management and care in the store they will be able to handle it as much business as at present at a less cost and to better satisfaction of their customers.

FARMERS OPERATING THRESHING MACHINE

Some forty to fifty Lehi farmers lined together and purchased a threshing machine which is now doing work for them and their neighbors. A company has been formed known as the Lehi Farmers Threshing Machine Company. The stock of the organization sells for fifty dollars per acre.

GIRL AUTO THIEF BACKS STOLEN CAR IN DITCH HERE AND DISAPPEARS

About 11 o'clock Friday night a large car backed into the ditch near the high school. Local citizens passing were asked for assistance to get it out by a young woman and a man. Their efforts were fruitless however, as the ditch was full of water and the bank high. The occupants of the car immediately rode away in a passing auto when they saw the car could not be quickly gotten out and have not been heard of since.

The next morning a Salt Lake officer was on the scene and took charge of the car, saying it had been stolen from that city. The Tribune carried the following note of the incident relative to the taking of the machine:

"A blonde of twenty years with a brown hat supporting a giddy feather is the latest entry into the automobile stealing sweepstakes, according to the report made yesterday to the police by J. L. DuBoyce, 508 East Tenth street, Cheyenne, Wyo.

REPUBLICAN CONVENTION DATES SET

The Republican convention dates have been set and the notice is now being published.

The county convention at which Lehi is entitled to 31 representatives of the total 370 will be held at Provo, Wednesday, September 15th, when the county ticket will be nominated.

The convention of the Fourth Judicial District Republicans for the purpose of nominating a Judge and District Attorney, will be held in Provo, Wednesday, August 25, at 10 o'clock a. m. A Republican state nomination convention will be held in Salt Lake City, Thursday, August 26, at 10 o'clock a. m., and a convention of the Second Congressional District will be held in Salt Lake City, Friday, August 27th, at 10 o'clock a. m. To each one of these conventions, Utah County is entitled to 55 delegates, 5 of which Lehi furnishes.

EFFICIENCY PRIZE IS ON EXHIBITION

The exhibition of the large bronze tablet presented by the Utah-Idaho Sugar company to the factory which makes the best efficiency record in a season's run has attracted considerable attention in the Z. C. M. I. window, Salt Lake City. The plaque bears a likeness of Thomas R. Cutler, former general manager of the company, now vice-president.

This tablet is presented annually to the factory of the company which is rated highest among those having the Steffens process. A similar tablet, bearing the likeness of C. W. Nibley, general manager, is to be presented the factory without the Steffens process which registers highest. The factories will this year compete for the prize money, which, in case of an exceptionally high record, can reach \$50,000. Permanent employees of the cash prize winning plant participate in the distribution of the prize. The awards are made in keeping with the policy of the company to promote friendly rivalry among the plants and to reward their employees for especially meritorious efforts.

The words "Thomas R. Cutler" form the top line on the tablet and directly underneath is placed the bas-relief of Mr. Cutler, the head being about three-quarters size and a strikingly good likeness. The companion tablet bears the likeness of Mr. Nibley. This was won last year by the non-Steffens process plant at West Jordan.

The local mill employees are planning to put forth every effort this fall to capture the coveted tablet and prize money and are confident of winning them.

Lehi People In Auto Accident

A Ford car, in which Mrs. S. A. Smith, Mrs. Joseph Smith, Chester Smith and Miss Eva Hutchings were riding, collided with a large Buick car occupied by Mr. and Mrs. G. L. Bemis and H. W. Horne of Salt Lake at the foot of the hill just south of Sandy, Saturday afternoon at 3 o'clock. Both were badly damaged but the occupants escaped with only minor bruises.

The big car, which was going south, skidded off the road turned almost around and tipped upon its side. The rear right wheel was broken off, the top mashed and the hood and fenders bent. The Ford machine remained upright, the damage amounting to a bent front axle, and fender and a broken front spring.

The Smith family, accompanied by Miss Hutchings, were on their way to Salt Lake to attend a theatre. They had just reached the bottom of the hill going into Sandy when they saw the big car coming toward them. It was in the middle of the road and they were also well into the center of the cement. Mr. Smith said he swung to his right and at the same time the big car, now almost to them, swung the same way. In order to prevent a head on collision Mr. Smith turned sharply to the left. At the same instant the other driver turned the same way and the cars struck one another. The front left wheel of the Ford crashed into the rear left side of the bigger car. The Smith machine was brought to a stop on the left side of the concrete in an upright position but the other car commenced to skid and went nearly seventy-five feet sidewise before the rear wheel broke and tipped the car over onto its side.

The two men in the Buick machine climbed out and pounced upon Mr. Smith, who with the other occupants of his car, had run to assist them. They struck him several times before witnesses of the accident and other members of the party could interfere.

Both machines were taken into Sandy for repairs and the auto parties were taken home in other cars.

FORMER LEHI WOMAN BADLY HURT

Mrs. Mae Racker Carson, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. W. E. Racker, had a narrow escape from death at her home town, Electra, Texas, during the last week in July, according to word just received by local relatives.

State Road Paving Work

Work of paving the State Road within Lehi City will commence about September 1st according to officials of the Strange-McGuire contracting company. A switch is being built east of the Salt Lake Route station where the company's stationary mixers will be erected. Work on this erection will possibly start this week.

Gravel for the cement will be taken from the vicinity of the county and city beds providing an analysis by the state chemist proves the mixture O. K. for cement work. Negotiations are now under way to purchase gravel in this locality from which to take the gravel.

The County road work on Main Street is progressing rapidly. Providing no more trouble is had the contractors should finish the stretch this week. The contract calls for cementing to the D. & R. G. tracks, which leaves just three blocks more to do. They have been laying a little better than one city block per day when working at capacity. At this rate they would easily complete the road by Saturday evening. They were nearly to the bank corner last evening.

The work of paving the remaining part of Main Street for the two blocks is yet in the air. The required time for advertising and hearing protests, etc., from property owners is not yet up and before the settlement of all the questions entering into the matter the present work will be done. However the contractors have agreed to leave their machinery here for a time and it is likely they will do the work, it is claimed.
