## Basketball Season Opens Here

School and Legion Teams Promise Local Fans Plenty of Entertainment This Winter.—H. S. Line Will Be Strong Contenders For First Honors.—Legion Men Expect to Make Cleanup.

Athletic interest is turning to basketball which sport promises big things for Lehi this winter. The school athletes have commenced practice as, also, have the widely known Legion team. Both started during this week. New suits have been purchased for players on the lineups.

The outlook for the high school is good, Coach Mitchell says. The men with one or more years experience is showing up well and a whole string of husky substitutes, already developing form, will be no trouble in getting ready to make a winning team. The outlook at this season for a winter team was never brighter in the past years.

Old men back and now working the new material follow in order: Leland Merrill, B. Smuin, Clark, Clemen Turner, Morris, Joseph Peterson and LeRoy.

The first game of the season will be Friday evening with the Magna team. The league games will be held sometime near Christmas, it is said.

Legion basketball men got together last week and took up a collection to buy suits and other equipment for the season's contests. Enough was obtained and, on Monday suits, shoes, etc., were purchased and practice started. Clark, Evans, Davis, Wanlass, Southwick, N. Afton Giles, Herbert Austin and others have been invited to join the team, most of whom have already been out.

An unusual record made by the team last year put them at the top in the mountain country. They have beaten two or three times the entire season in spite of the fact that they met the strongest teams in this and other states. They are out to win the championship and if their lineup can be put together they will undoubtedly do it.

Yet they have not booked any games and will not arrange a schedule until after the school schedule has worked out, they announced. They are planning to play one game at regular, one at home and one away. In addition, however, there will be other games with travel teams when it is possible. Games of the Legion and high school will be staged in the Smuin gym. Both organizations have agreements with the manager for the use of the hall.

The board of state canvassers Wednesday completed its work of compiling the election returns throughout the state, so far as offices pertaining to more than one county are concerned.

The only Democrat elected out of all the names canvassed by the state board was Judge George Christensen in the Seventh Judicial district, comprising Sanpete, Carbon, Emery, Grand and San Juan counties.

The total vote for presidential electors were: Democrats, 56,839; Republicans, 81,555; Socialists, 3,159; Farmer-Labor, 4,475.

## Dr. Worlton Elected School Board Member

Receives 210 Votes of 262 Cast.—Eugene Mason Receives 28, S. I. Goodwin 19, Joseph Anderson 2 and Joseph Broadbent 1.

Dr. F. D. Worlton was elected to the Alpine School Board as the Lehi representative yesterday (Wednesday) when he received 210 of the 262 votes cast. There was no other candidate on the ticket and really no opposition to him. Other candidates voted for, with the number of votes follows: Eugene Mason 28, S. I. Goodwin 19, Joseph Anderson 2, Edward Southwick 1, and Joseph Broadbent 1.

Little interest was shown in the election and not nearly as many votes would have been cast had it not been for the rumor and fear that a dark horse might be placed in the field. S. I. Goodwin, whose nomination had been filed withdrawn on Monday leaving Dr. Worlton as the only nominee on the ticket. Too many

jobs were given as the reason for the withdrawal.

Dr. Worlton is well qualified for the position, having had experience as teacher and principal of schools and is a successful man from a business standpoint. He will make an excellent representative for Lehi.

In Pleasant Grove 10 votes elected S. L. Swensen to succeed Charles G. Johnson, the second member of the board going out of office this year.
