CANNON AND MUSSER.

Are They Honest Men or Are They Humbugs?

EDITOR DEMOCRAT:—The man who makes sacrifices for what he believes to be the right, is entitled to respect, however mistaken he may be.

Both Cannon and Musser, by their attorneys in their late trials, and in person when called for sentence, claimed to have lived within the provisions of the Edmunds law since its passage and not to have disobeyed it.

NEVERTHELESS, BOTH WERE CONVICTED. There was no material contest over the facts involved in either case. The substance of the contest was on the proper construction of the word cohabit, as used in the statute.

Now, as to the cases of Cannon and Musser, of what importance is this distinction between their definition of cohabitation and the Court's definition? What is the difference between the two definitions so far as these men or their future is concerned?
