Proceedings at the City Council on Tuesday evening, January 13th, 1880. Mayor Little presiding. A petition from Lewis Orvitt, asking that he be granted the right of way for a wagon road through the southeast corner of the Warm Spring enclosure, was referred to the committee on public grounds.

Business is picking up slightly since the holidays' dull reaction. The Utah Road and Gun Society held its first annual meeting last night. The boys are preparing for the grand calico ball tomorrow evening. A billiard match takes place on the 15th—Thursday; or it was so arranged. "Scopped Skyward" is the way the Reader heads an account of a fatal accident. Ogden had seventy-five deaths in the last two months; somewhat for a small town.
