FORTY-SIXTH CONGRESS.

REGULAR SESSION.

SENATE.

Washington, 5.—The bill relieving Pay Director Charles W. Abbott from liability for the delinquency of his subordinate, was opposed by Saultsbury, who thought the practice of passing such bills invited carelessness in the administration of public funds.

HOUSE.

Washington, 5.—Carlisle introduced a bill fixing the duties on sugar, as follows: On all sugar not above No. 13, Dutch standard in color, 240-1000, per pound; above No. 13 and not above No. 16, 40c. per pound; provided that nothing herein contained shall be construed to alter or amend the act of August 15, 1876, to carry into effect the convention between the United States and the King of the Hawaiian Islands. Territorial Government for Alaska.

Washington, 5.—Senator Butler, yesterday, reported a bill from the committee on territories for the organization of the Territory of Alaska, and the establishment of a civil government therefor.

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FOREIGN.

Madrid, 5.—In Congress, to day, Señor Sagasta, in the name of the constitutionality, said he was anxious to see social, political and financial reforms introduced, together with the promulgation, in Cuba, of the constitution of 1876, or a special constitutional law.

Bio Janeiro, 5.—The Chilian fleet was in the bay of Valparaiso, commander of the iron clad, Huiasur, was killed during the engagement.

Paris, 5.—La Océanisation, clerical organ, has been fined 1,000 francs from insulting President Grévy and Waddington.

Le Temps says the Russian revolutionary manifesto published here to-day is merely the work of intriguing agents, seeking to embroil France in a quarrel with Russia.

Dublin, 5.—The Mansion House relief committee has received a letter from Kynberley, South Africa diamond fields, stating that a movement has been organized there for an aid fund; also one from the Irish relief committee at Buenos Ayres, stating that a similar movement was on foot there.

Paris, 5.—It is said that on the centennial of the anniversary of the surrender of Yorktown, the government will be officially invited by the Washington cabinet to be represented at the celebration.

Some Gold.

Washington, 5.—There is, at present, \$45,000,000 worth of gold bullion in the New York assay office, ready to be transported to the Pacific coast by the Panama route.
