Field Crops. Loring Wheat.—Experiments at different depths favor, in ordinary soil, one or two inches. Samples of pure seed sown one half inch in depth came up in eleven days, seven-eighths of the seed germinating; that sown one inch in depth came up in twelve days, and all germinated; two inches deep seven-eighths of it came up in eighteen days; three inches deep, three quarters of it came up in twenty days; four inches showed a growth of one-half, that came up in twenty-one days; five inches, only one-half grew and came up in twenty-two days, while that planted six inches deep came up in twenty-three days, but only one-third germinated.
