INDIANS.

The Agreement with the Utes—Retreat. Washington, 21.—The exact features of the agreement as to the lands which the Colorado Indians are to be allowed to occupy hereafter, have not yet been published.

San Francisco, 21.—There is a rumor about here today that the General Grant is to be sent to the Gulf of Mexico.

San Francisco, 21.—The board of ward presidents of the workingmen's party, at a meeting, today, passed resolutions denouncing the sentence of Kearney and Gannon as outrageous, and charging the police judge with gross partiality.

San Francisco, 21.—The Times says the conviction and sentence of one of Kearney's trusty lieutenants in the San Francisco police court, will have a cooling effect on the minds of the followers, who they were rebuffed by an innkeeper from whom they demanded the discharge of high Chinese servants.

San Francisco, 21.—Fifty Chinamen arrived by the Erie Road yesterday. Most of them go to towns in the interior, to take up their abode in the selected places to settle in.

San Francisco, 21.—A Los Angeles dispatch says Hoyle, absconding tax collector from Atlanta, Georgia, was held, last evening, in \$30,000. The case will come before the grand jury on Tuesday, on a writ of habeas corpus.

San Francisco, 21.—A commission of five doctors appointed to inquire into the sanity of the assassin of Oliver Combs pronounced him insane.

San Francisco, 21.—During the program of an entertainment given by the public school in the Public Hall, last night, at which about 600 persons were present, part of the floor gave way, precipitating between 100 and 150 persons to the floor below.

San Francisco, 21.—While putting up the frame of a hotel on the island yesterday afternoon, a heavy gust of wind wrecked the structure to the ground, seriously injuring eight workmen.

San Francisco, 21.—The Herald's Washington correspondent says that the chief obstacle to the attempt to negotiate a modified treaty with China has been the strong inclination which prevails in the authorities of that country to adopt a policy of exclusion toward the citizens of the United States and the commerce of this country.

San Francisco, 21.—Russia intends to renew negotiations on the Kaula question, only through the Russian charge d'affaires at Peking. It is therefore likely that the visit to St. Petersburg of the Chinese ambassador at London will be fruitless.

San Francisco, 21.—The Herald's New Haven special says that the Chinese government having contracted with the Winchester Arms Company for cartridges, but there has been some small orders for arms from China.

Memphis, 21.—Rumors are unconfirmed of breaks in the levees between Memphis and Vicksburg.
