Not a City of the "Blues," but One with a Very Bright Outlook.

The Woolen Mills in Blast, and Everything Looming.

Provo, March 22, 1880.

Editors Herald:

The communication from "W. B." published in last Friday's issue of the Herald, is strange news to the people of Provo. Your correspondent must have been hoaxed up since last December and drawn heavily upon his imagination, or spent the winter in "Goshen or the deserts of Utah where the people have really suffered from the severity of the winter, and written up Provo from his experience and observations in places less fortunate than our city. "W. B." evidently has been "hoaxed" in a very different form, judging from his communication; but it does the good people of Provo a gross injustice when he says they are all in the same unfortunate frame of mind, for the exact opposite is the fact. It is true there has been a great scarcity of hay, this winter, as has been the case everywhere, but I have heard of no one suffering, and on the whole Provo has been very fortunate in this regard, all things considered.

Relative to the scarcity of hay, I will venture to say that there are 300 tons for sale in Provo, to-day, and those who are cut of that article have the "stierwith" to purchase it, and certainly our stock is not so limited for want of food more than at any previous winter. We have done a larger business in shipping hay this winter than any other settlement in the territory, and still have two hundred tons constantly coming from which hay is shipped to supply the demand in the south. Our teams and cattle were never in a better condition at this season of the year, and the stock that has been on the range is in an excellent condition.

Provo has certainly had its share of theatricals during the winter. From the letter of your correspondent it will be inferred that the company, managed by Mr. H. Malbon, headed Mr. E. Margate in the successful performance of the "Lancashire Lass," such is not the case. The "Home Company," managed by Mr. J. C. Graham, and which has given such entire satisfaction to the community, sustained Mr. Margate in his engagement here.

The Provo Woolen Mills started up in full blast to-day (Monday), with every prospect for a long and successful run. The mills were never in a better condition, and under the able management of Mr. James Dixon cannot fail to do well this coming season.

Everybody is feeling well over the bright outlook for the future, and our business men are preparing for a result of trial when spring opens. Our mercantile establishments have never done a better business at this season of the year than they are doing now.

Work has been commenced on the construction of a theatre and lecture hall, which will cost, when completed, between \$6,000 and \$7,000, and will be a credit to our city.

Quite a number of our citizens are going to put up dwelling houses the coming summer, which will add materially to the attractiveness of the town, and when spring opens prepare our friend "W. B." will emerge from his hiding place and discover that he is not "hoaxed" in the only "blue" man in our growing city.
