Big Blazes.

New York, 10.—This morning the hull of the lumber vessel Niagara, still afloat, floated against a pier occupied by the American Export Lumber Co. pier, at Hunter's Point. The premises occupied by the company occupies both sides of New York Canal. At the time the Niagara came in contact with the pier they were unloading a large number of vessels.
