PEOPLE'S TICKET.

Baltimore's celebration of its sesqui-centennial closed on Saturday. It was a superb affair.

At Montreal low water has stopped the mills, throwing six hundred workmen out of employment.

It is again rumored that the Car's continued ill-health makes him loath to abdication in favor of the Czarowitch.

GEN. HAWLEY and Mark Twain made speeches of welcome on the occasion of Grant's visit to Hartford on Saturday.

GREECE is about to inform the powers that if the Greek frontier question is not settled by a specified time she will occupy the disputed provinces.

GENERAL CARALLERO, Paraguayan minister of the Interior, has succeeded to the presidency of the republic, Don Cardilo Barero, president, having died.

THE PORTUGUESE again concluded to surrender Daigoin to the Montenegro, and sent a commissioner to arrange for the cession, the powers will each have a representative present at the surrender. One of these days the "Eastern question" will be settled for a few minutes, and then we will all be happy.

THE BONAPARTISTS hostile to Prince Jerome Napoleon held a meeting in Paris, on Saturday, and after an excited discussion adopted a resolution summoning him to renounce his candidature and recognize Victor Napoleon as heir to the throne. As heir to the throne of France is heir to nothing, Jerome ought to be willing to retire in favor of his poor relations.

THE NEW YORK SUN struck a solemn and solid truth, in its editorial of Sunday, which appears elsewhere. The democratic ticket of 1880 should have been Tilden and Hendricks. If the party is defeated it can blame nobody for the defeat, except its own moral cowardice, and the meanness which caused the democracy to set aside the strongest presidential ticket that it has ever had.

GOVERNOR PITKIN, of Colorado, "talks back" to the federal government in true western fashion. The governor thinks, as everybody in Colorado thinks, that Mr. Schurz's dealings with the Ute are child's play. The governor is also tired, as everybody else is, of the trifling business that has been going on ever since the Meeker massacre. While Pitkin wants to respect the general government, he wants the latter to respect Colorado and its citizens; and also to accord to whites the same rights, at least, as are bestowed upon Indians. The governor's telegram, which is published in this issue of the HERALD, is entertaining and lively reading.

ON SATURDAY the French police closed sixteen Carmelite and Barnabite establishments, ejecting the 300 inmates. There were demonstrations of sympathy in some cases on the part of the populace, and in one case, a bishop, in full pontificals, waited on the prefect and informed him that he was excommunicated. At Agen the police forced the doors and expelled the inmates. More French magistrates have resigned because of the decrees against the religious orders, but still the work goes on. In Spain, also, state opposition to priests in politics has been announced, the papal nuncio having been informed that all priests who introduce politics in their sermons, will be expelled from Spanish territory. The Pope, who has been appealed to, is firm in his determination not to interfere in the political affairs of nations and has reminded bishops that their mission is one of peace.

HAMPTON AND SHERMAN.

Hampton Asks Sherman If He Meant What He Said.

Sherman Says He Did Not.

And the sequel is Yet to Come.

Washington, 18.—Secretary Sherman has furnished for publication the following:

DAGUERRE SPRINGS, Sept. 20, 1880.

To Hon. John Sherman, Secretary of the Treasury:

Sir—Some days ago I saw a report of your speech at a conference held by the national republican committee at the Fifth Avenue Hotel, New York, and you were quoted as having used the following language: "And now you are asked to surrender all you have done into the hands of Wade Hampton, the kuklux, and the like segment in the north that is called the democratic party." May I ask if you used these words? And if you did so, did you mean to connect me directly or indirectly with what was known as the kuklux klan? Requesting an early reply, I am, Sir, very respectfully, your obedient servant.

WASHINGTON, Sept. 21, 1880.

Honorable Wade Hampton, care Augustus Schell, New York:

Sir—Your note of the 17th inst. received, in which you inquire, etc. In reply, I have to advise you that while I do not remember the precise language, I presume the reporter correctly stated in a condensed way his idea of what I said. I have no doubt that I spoke of you as the leading representative of the democratic party in the south, and referred to the kuklux klan as the representative of the barbarous agencies by which the democratic party has subverted the civil and political rights of the republicans of the south. I do not connect you personally with the kuklux klan. Indeed, I know you had in one or two important instances resisted and defeated its worst impulses. I appreciate that sense of honor which makes you shrink from being named in connection with it; still, you and your associates, leading men in the south, now enjoy the benefits of the political power derived from the kuklux klan, in which phrase I include all the numerous agencies by which it has from time to time been known in the south. Your power in the southern states rests upon actual crimes of every grade in the code of crime, from murder to the meanest form of ballot box stuffing, committed by the kuklux klan and its hundred associates.

As you know, some of the worst of them have been committed since 1877, when you and they gave the most solemn assurances of protection to the freedmen of the south. These crimes are all aimed at the civil and political rights of the republicans in the south, and as I believe, but for these agencies, every state that you represent, as well as many other states in the south, could be represented both in the Senate and House by republicans, but for these crimes. The boast attributed to you that 138 solid southern votes would [Here the report breaks off.—Eos.]

Rough on Agent Berry et al.

Denver, 18.—Advises from Sagate say that Wm. S. Beck, a government scout, gives testimony which goes to prove that Berry, Meacham, Holmes and Cline intentionally gave young Jackson over to the Indians. He says Col. Beaumont who, with his cavalry, was a short distance from Cline's ranch, en route to Garland, offered to protect the freighters, but Berry and others ordered him to proceed to Garland. The scout states that he examined the place where the Indians were supposed to have forcibly taken Jackson, but found no sign of a struggle.

Foreign Flashes

London, 18.—The Viceroy of India telegraphed that Kuram Valley was evacuated Saturday.

Five steamers have been ordered built on the Clyde for a new French company, to trade with the United States.

A St. Petersburg dispatch says: Russia has ordered the commander of the Pacific squadron to survey the entire coast of Korea as soon possible.

Toronto, 18.—Dispatches from North and Northwestern Ontario report a severe snow storm in progress. About a foot of snow has already fallen.

The P. E. Convention.

New York, 18.—In the Protestant Episcopal Convention a report was adopted that the church is not ready to make a rule of the free pew system. The committee on the subject reported the resolutions that a canon be adopted setting apart dissonances for church work—care of the poor and sick, education of the young, charity, etc., being their work. Dissonances must be 21 years old, and usually 25, and be fitted for such work. The report was placed on the calendar.

Railroad War.

St. Louis, Mo., 18.—Yesterday the Alton road cut the rates to Council Bluffs to \$2.50, and to Omaha \$7, via Kansas City; and to-day the Wabash dropped to the same. The prices to Chicago and Kansas City remain at \$1, and round trip rates to Chicago, \$3.40. The Missouri Pacific meets all cuts west, and speculation in the about ceased. There is no public announcement of a cut to eastern points, although the participation of eastern roads is likely.

Grave Trouble Apprehended.

New York, 18.—The Post's Washington special says: Dispatches of a very serious tenor were received at the interior department, to-day, from Colorado. The officers at present decline to make them public. A conference was held with the officers of the war department, and grave trouble is evidently apprehended.

The Presidential Party.

San Francisco, 18.—The President and party left, this afternoon, for Yosemite; will go to Los Angeles on Saturday next; thence they go east via Arizona, Santa Fe and Kansas City.

Heavy Snowstorm.

Buenos Ayres, 18.—A terrific snowstorm occurred in this province on the 18th of September, and it is estimated that 100,000 cattle, 500,000 sheep and 20,000 horses perished.

A Peaceful Phase.

Berlin, 18.—The negotiations between China and Japan in regard to the Leechow question have now entered a phase promising a peaceful solution.

The Car to Retire.

Vienna, 18.—The Press: We learn on the best authority that the Princess Dolgorouki was married to the Car as a younger prince of the government of Moscow, and not as a sister of Count Alberdinski. Negotiations respecting the future position of the Princess Dolgorouki and her children are still pending. It is proposed that the latter be recognized as princess of blood and take rank after the grand dukes. Should the Car consent to this arrangement the Car will appoint him co-regent and transfer to him the reins of government, the Car retaining the imperial privileges and retiring permanently to Livadia.

Early Weather.

St. Paul, 18.—The storm was not very severe here, but the wires are down in all directions around the city. Nothing is known of the Northern Pacific country yet, except the report that the storm is more severe and snow heavier than it was all last winter.
