DELEGATE ELECTION, Tuesday, Nov. 2, 1880. PEOPLE'S TICKET. "THE HIGHEST POSSIBLE LIBERTY TO MAN AND WOMAN."

THURLOW WARD, the veteran journalist, compares the work of Moody and Col. The Ogdens people will remember a fellow by the name of Freeman who journeyed to their city a year or two ago. He printed a weekly paper there; that is, he printed one side of it in Ogdens, the other side being printed in California. Freeman went to Montana last year, and started two weekly papers, one at Butte and the other in Glendale. It seems that in the north he is pursuing the same course that has marked his career in the past, namely, that of a newspaper prostitute. In Ogdens he tried to play it "fine" and secure Mormon support for his wily-washy journal; but the trick was so transparent that all saw through it. He then tried to make his paper a Gentle organ, but Gentiles were more disgusted with the fellow than the Mormons had been. He tried to be democratic, and then republican, and finally, being on the verge of starvation, crawled out for Montana. When the campaign in that territory opened, Freeman and his two papers pointed on the fence for a time, and then flopped over on the republican side, since which they have been working for Saunders, republican candidate for delegate to Congress. An explanation has now been found. At a political meeting in Walkerville, near Butte, the other evening, one of the speakers read the following, which had been given him by Magnus, present delegate and candidate for reelection:

GLENDALE, MONTANA, October 16, 1880. Hon. Martin Magnus. Dear Sir:—What patronage and what cash can be secured to the Frontier Journal and the Montana if we advocate your cause? Of course you are aware that the balance of power lies in Deer Lodge, and I have endeavored, with the consent of people from the northwestern states the result is by no means certain. Mr. Magnus refused to have anything to do with a fellow so base as Freeman had proven himself to be, but it seems the republican candidate was not above buying the man's principles and papers. It is to be regretted that types and ink cannot be kept out of the hands of the Freemans of this world, the same as whisky is sometimes withheld from men whose appetites would soon lead them into the gutter.

THE INDIANA election did not kill the democratic party. It took away the party's breath for a moment, and frightened the organization out of a week's growth. But that is all. The chances of success are in fact as good to-day as they were three months ago. We think they are better. A small majority in Indiana would have given democrats dangerous confidence. They would have rested during the three weeks before the presidential election, and thus might have lost in the great battle. The minor defeat only spurred them up to increase their efforts. After recovering from the temporary shock, they went to work, and have kept it up with an earnestness and a determination which mean victory. It is clear that the party is desperate, and intends to win if such a thing be possible, which it certainly is. The leaders have ceased their efforts in states that are not doubtful. They are fending away nothing in such republican sections as Iowa and Vermont, or in democratic states like Georgia, the Carolina, etc.; but are concentrating money and muscle in doubtful territory, as New Hampshire and Indiana.

The Agent Berry Business. Denver, Col., 28.—A New's Gannion City special says small bands of Indians are reported scouring the country around there, endeavoring to create an outbreak, and declare their intention of liberating Captain Cline, who is in Gunnison City under arrest, implicated with having turned Jackson over to the Indians. Three companies of militia have been formed under command of Captain Bean, and the city is placed under their control.

In the United States District Court, to-day, Judge Hallett refused to comply with a petition requesting that Agent Berry be turned over to the state authorities. It is understood that state warrants will be issued, and in the event of Berry's discharge before the United States commissioner, he will be rearrested and taken to Gunnison City for trial. Berry has not yet arrived here.

THE FORGERY FRAUD.

The Letter is in Court, and Pronounced a Forgery. And After All, What Does it All Amount to?

Philip an Old Forger

New York, 27.—At the examination of Kenward Philip, to-day, on the charge of forging the letter which was signed by Joseph R. Payne, expert of handwriting for thirty years, Albert F. Southworth, Daniel T. Ames, expert for twenty-five years, all testified that, after careful examination, in their belief the letter was unquestionably a forgery, and was written and signed by Kenward Philip. Philip was hailed by Gen. F. Spinola and James Fay, the latter a deputy sheriff. It is said that this is not the first time that Philip has tried his hand at forgery, although in a previous case he did not get into the courts. Kings County democratic convention of 1876, there was a sharp contest for the trusteeship between Philip and Loring, and the latter was only successful by one vote. While things were at this point, a petition purporting to have been signed by prominent citizens of Brooklyn, was presented to the convention, urging the nomination of Wm. D. Vester, then surrogate. It afterwards ascertained that many of the signatures to the petition were forgeries, and it is said that the forger was Philip. Philip is an Englishman, about 55 or 60 years old.

Yesterday's Philadelphia Bulletin says: In connection with the fact announced in our telegraphic columns, that the letter which is alleged to have been written by Garfield-Morey letter has been arrested, we present the following very interesting account of the circumstances on the subject, given to us by a prominent member of the bar and a business man of the city, who in their possession saw very important documents relating to the matter, and these gentlemen assert that the signature to the forged letter is a facsimile of Garfield's handwriting. Other letters which are facsimiles of Garfield's handwriting were at the same time. Rosecrans is the democratic candidate for Congress in California, and it is an open question whether he could have been induced to this thing or not.

The Tribune says: The arrest of the so-called journalist connected with the newspaper which published the forged Chinese labor letter, is the result of some days of excellent detective work. The evidence that the forged letter is said to be overhauled, and there seems to be reason to hope that he will pay the penalty of his crime, but what the seal of his accessories after the fact, who are to be numbered by thousands and who stand right in the way of the democratic national committee participated in this man's acts, knowing that Garfield had denounced the letter as a forgery. They persisted in publishing it, even after it had been proved by evidence which would have been complete in any court, that Garfield could not have written it. Democratic newspapers of the best rank assisted in this shameful political crime, and democratic organs who have always been regarded as gentlemen, followed their manœuvre. This man Philip ought to go to jail, but the demands of justice would be fully satisfied only upon sending the managers of the democratic national committee and the Boston Herald to jail, and the editors of the World, Tribune and Philip's arrest says there is no evidence of his guilt. 
