

Ericson's Terrible Engine of

Death Beath.

Chicago, 10.—Inter-Occun'z New York: The Trabuse will print, to-marrow, a full and accursts account of John Reiczon's wonderful new torpedo bost. It is the most formidable engine of death known in naval warfare. The investor of the monitor is one of the most modest and unpresentious mechanics of the sge not likely to exagginate the merits of his swan work. He is entirely satisfied with the results of recent experiments with his surded boat and some of the most experienced naval officers in the U ited States service do not besitate to promotince it as unsequivocal success. It will be seen that Captain Ericson has invented three things, a busis, a gun and a projectcounce it as unsquireced success. It will be seen that Captain Ericcon has invented three things, a boat, a gun and a projectile. The boat is submerged like a monitor, with all the machinery below an intermediate deck of plate iron which is strongly ribbed and supports the inclined armor plates. The deck house above water has no ports at her sides and can be split away without the vessel being disabled. A heavy wood backing gives additional protection to the wheel, and the electric battery and steering gear is ten feet below the water line and defying with her armor the heaviest ordenance. The destroyer is practically invalourable, and at the same time the most terrible antagonist. Her armosment consists of a single brench loader of wrought iros, hooped with steel, and a bore of sixteen inches. This gun lies seven feet under water, and will discharge a projectile containing 250 pounds of dynamite. When the boat with its crew of ten men is within 500 or 460 feet of the enemy, the cun is fired by electricity and a projectile explades by a necession. If the first shot falls another follows in a few minutes and the torpost bombardment proceeds with extraordinary rapidity, no time being wasted in charging the gun. The substitution or gunpawder for compressed air in the operation of charging the gun wastly in reases the efficiency of the armament.
