SOUTHERN ARIZONA.

The Land of Big Ledges, Cacti and Tarantulas.

Thinking a few lines from an old reader might prove of interest to you and your readers, I will attempt to give you a short and descriptive outline of southern Arizona, as viewed by an "Old-Timer."

California District was discovered some ten years ago by a company of soldiers, who were chasing the Indians. Since then the camp has remained comparatively quiet, till some three months ago, when it awoke with renewed activity, and now it is fairly boiling with excitement. The ledges are very large—in fact, we do not know their width—and I can honestly say that I have seen one 60 feet wide and another 40 feet, the ore assaying from \$20 to \$243 per ton. The ore is of a base nature, and the formation is limestone, porphyry, and granite.

The smelting and milling facilities cannot be beaten, for there is an abundance of wood and a sufficient supply of water—the latter is located and claimed by Messrs F. F. Letcher and E. P. Van Hagen, two old prospectors, and I think, Reeser. There is an eastern company operating here. They have just bought a mine for \$10,000, and the property is considered cheap at \$50,000. Two more mines have been located for \$10,000, one for \$3,000, and others for some ranging from \$150 upwards.

We have quite a few capitalists in camp, one of whom is Professor John K. James, of Boston. They all expect themselves as highly pleased with the camp. We are continually growing in numbers, for new faces are arriving every day. We will have a furnace running in about sixty days, and then look out for a boom. We have a townsite laid out, and the surveys are expected in every day to survey it. Our population numbers about 200, but before spring it will be 1,000. We have one store and a saloon. Parties here are also organizing for a sawmill. We are situated on the eastern slope of the Chiricahua (pronounced Chir-ree-cow) mountains, eighty miles due east from Tombstone, and twenty-five miles from San Simon, (our present address), on the Southern Pacific Railroad. The climate is magnificent, but rather cold at night, and sleep very comfortably under three pairs of blankets. Wild game, such as deer, antelope and wild turkey, are plentiful, and the majority of the boys are heartily sick of venison and are praying for fresh beef. Potatoes are \$c, and onions 12c, per pound, flour \$7.75 per hundred, bacon 21c, and beans 10c, per pound, so you see they know how to charge for grub.

I met a great many Reesers in Tombstone, among whom were Neil Boyle, Blake Boyce, Pete Gill, John O'Day, B. D. Parker, T. J. McPhee, Walter Parker, Pete Heitsman, Charles Baldwin, Judge Foster, Willie Spicer and Jim Lard, and I hear that there are several more on the road. Charles McElroy and Frank Hester are also in Tombstone. Well, let the boys come, and very quietly of them for as all of them are very pretty. Arno went dem-ocratic.

Well, I will choke myself off for this time, and will write you again as we progress.—Silver Reel Miner.

MINING NOTES

We are informed by good authority that the ten stamp mill here, that has been lying idle for the past five or six years is about to be put in motion, on ore from the old Hickory mine. Messrs Cook and Woodworth have a large quantity of ore on the dump and plenty more of the rich material in sight, which they intend to bring out promptly by putting on an increase of hands.—Milford Sentinel.

Times are looking exceedingly gloomy on the Coast, and the Lyon County Times dismally announces that the large number of men who have been discharged from the mines and the Suro Tunnel during the past few weeks are not likely to be again put to work until the discovery of the long sought for bonanza creates demand for their services. This will probably not occur for months, anyway. Prior to the first of the coming month when men began to be laid off, there were already hundreds of unemployed men on the Coast, most of whom were heads of families, who could not get away to seek employment elsewhere. Winter is coming on and promises to be more vigorous than for many years past, but there is no likelihood of their springing up any annual demand for laborers. The consequent suffering before next Spring will therefore be very great. It behooves all unemployed men who can possibly get away to leave the Coast for a while.

Probably the largest rock in the world is the South Omine of the Yosemite. Standing at the fork of the upper valley, it rears its tall, wind, rocky top, 6,000 feet above the ground. A more powerful hand than that of God has cut away the eastern half, leaving a sheer precipice of over a mile in height. No man ever trod the top of this dome until last year. Former visitors gazed in wonder at the spires driven into the rocks by hardy spirits who had repeatedly endeavored to scale it. The shreds of rope dangling in the wind told the story of their failure. Last year, however, after thousands of dollars had been expended, several persons found their way to the top of the dome, and this summer two sheep were found browsing on the hitherto inaccessible peak.

NEW PROCESSES.

The Latest Thing Out in Connection With Ore Reduction.

The hydro-chlorine system of ore reduction, says the Mining and Scientific Press, is the latest thing in processes. It is a new system by which silver, gold or lead ores are reduced at a cost not to exceed \$6 per ton; the complete plant for a smelter of five tons daily capacity, including license, costs \$5,000. The advertisement in the New York paper says: "The process is a radical new one. The company say that by this novel system, the full assay value is obtained, and with some classes of ore 10 to 20 per cent. more, it being a well established fact that quite a percentage of the precious metal volatilizes under the ordinary fire assay."

This beats most of the new processes. Very few of them claim to get over 98 or 99 per cent. of assay value, but this one promises to secure from 10 to 20 per cent. more. It seems to us that people with processes, especially those involving chemical principles, as nearly all do, make a great mistake, when they suppose the mining community to be entirely ignorant on such subjects. One man told us that by adding a certain substance to a natural mineral water he can produce gold. Another, in this instance, tells us that he can, by a smelting process, or one requiring a furnace heat, obtain more than a fire assay will show to be present, "because a percentage of the precious metals volatilize under the ordinary fire assay," which leads us to infer that there will be no satisfaction in his furnace. Such assertions are idle. They make any metallurgical smelter quietly, and any miner get his back up, and think "these fellows are giving us taffy." And it is "taffy." They don't go to work and give the public a description of their process which will be intelligible, and from which the public can draw its own conclusions. The conclusions only manufactured to order are giving publicly, and miners are supposed to swallow the statement, however absurd.

It is not many months since that a process was originated in San Francisco for working ore. In that case we are told that the ore yielded, "vapor assay," certain numbers of dollars and cents, which ordinary fire assays failed to show. We were told that the fire assays were made and did not show what was in the ore. That process and those "mines" are things of the past, but the fire assays are still believed in. Now, again, comes a process which will be a fire assay, and when we see the assertion backed by some competent and disinterested metallurgist, we may take it into consideration for investigation. But we won't believe it there. Mining men know something about such matters, and are not easily caught with craft. When they hear of a process to get 99 per cent. out of the ore, they don't believe it, and when they hear of one that is going to get more than the assay shows, they think either the projector is a fool, or that the projector thinks they are.


