New York, 26.—The hearing in the Washington of the Nicaragua canal scheme, which has become considerably interested by intelligence lately received from Europe in regard to the activity of Lesage and his friends in this country, and are beginning to be discussed in earnest in order to secure early action by Congress upon the bill introduced by Morton in the House. They fear that unless some action is taken soon, the government is in danger of its determination to enforce the Monroe doctrine, and ready to pronounce decidedly in favor of the Nicaragua project. Lesage will gain much sympathy and support in favor of the Panama scheme if the former will prove expensive.

Bilbao is preparing for a European tour of eight months, leaving the country in March and returning next November. He would go in February if it were not for the close vote in the Senate after March 3d.

Robert M. Wilson, agent of the Payne (Alabama) colony, succeeded on Saturday in securing an interview with the President. Wilson was accompanied by "Colonel" Bondroit, a half breed, who acted as interpreter. The President received Wilson courteously, and after hearing the story, frankly but bluntly replied that he had no objection to Congress in the direction of anything like an abrogation of the treaty. The attorney general had, however, considered the subject, rendered an opinion which, for the present, must stand as the construction of law. In the meantime, he said the President would not be forward any valid reasons for so doing, and the attorney general might review his opinion.

His preliminary examination takes place to-morrow morning. The evidence thus far indicates that Scott is a man of good character, and that Drury was a man of bad character, who had found upon the street in an intoxicated condition. General Scott entered the army during the late war as a private, and rose to the rank of brigadier general of volunteers. He was appointed provisional governor of South Carolina by President Johnson, and was afterwards elected governor. He has resided at Napoleon since 1874.

St. Louis, 26.—The evening six or eight drunkards roared to enter St. Louis, Mo., yesterday morning, between Market and Chestnut, but were refused admittance by Harry O'Brien, developer of the police. The trouble immediately became very abusive and quarrelsome, and Joseph O'Brien, brother of the developer, James McCormick, Geo. Gardner and James Kelly, who were standing on the sidewalk, took sides with the developer. A general fight ensued, during which Kelly, who was standing on the sidewalk, was knocked down and Joseph O'Brien received a dangerous cut in the breast, entering the cavity of the chest.
