THE ELECTRIC LIGHT.

All the machinery and apparatus for the Brush electric lighting system has arrived and will be put up as rapidly as possible. The generators are very large and formidable looking affairs, and are also capable each of generating current equal to more than 60,000 volts. Each generator will furnish current for 4,000 candle power lights. The lamps are neat-looking, and when suspended with ground glass globes will make a very handsome appearance. The electric light will be cheaper in Salt Lake than anywhere else in the world. In New York City \$1 a day per lamp has been obtained, while in other cities the price ranges from the lowest \$175 a year to \$400 the highest. In Salt Lake only about \$120 per year per light is charged, and we understand that the company will advance the price after the system is in operation. Mr. John Tupper, who is to have charge of the lamps and apparatus here, arrived from Cleveland Monday evening, and is now engaged in getting the system ready. Mr. Tupper is a well-known electrician and has been with the Brush Company for several years. It is expected that steam will be turned on Friday or Saturday, and that next week the lights will be in operation.
