CITY COUNCIL.

Proceedings at the City Council on Tuesday evening, May 31st, 1881, Mayor Little presiding:

A petition signed by Marie Schmeitler was presented, setting forth that by hard earnings she became the owner several years ago of a certain lot situated in the First Ward of this city. That by the late opening of the Jordan and Salt Lake City Canal all access by team to the upper corner of said lot was cut off, and the lot therefore rendered valueless to her. She therefore asked the city to buy the lot and to pay her therefor the sum of \$400, which would enable her to purchase land for her support elsewhere. Referred to the committee on claims.

A petition from B. Y. Hampton set forth that he wished to purchase block 117, plat D, Salt Lake City survey, provided the price fixed for the same shall not exceed what he considers to be reasonable. Referred to the committee on public grounds.

The city attorney, to whom was referred the committee on claims in relation to levying and collecting a tax for grading, paving and graveling certain sidewalks, with instructions to insert therein provisions for improving each sidewalk, as reported by the supervisor of streets, May 24th, 1881, submitted a report stating that he had prepared a substitute bill with that purpose in view, which substitute could be accepted in lieu of the original bill. Report accepted and the bill laid over to come up in its order.

Alderman Sheets, in behalf of the committee on public grounds, who were appointed to search out a suitable place for the location of the slaughter houses, reported that the committee had examined numerous locations and had given the subject careful attention, but failed to find a place more suitable than the one now apart from the purpose of the Council some years ago—between the Warm and Hot Springs. The committee thought that by mutual arrangement between the parties owning the land in that vicinity and those owning or desiring to erect slaughter houses, a ditch could be constructed and the refuse from the slaughter houses conveyed in it to the canal which empties into the Hot Spring Lake, and the surroundings be thus kept free from the offal and other filth which accumulates by reason of improper drainage. It was therefore recommended that said place be designated for the purpose referred to, and that all owners of slaughter houses located in other parts of the city be required to remove the same to said locality. Adopted.

The following bills for the month of May were allowed: Fire department expense bill, \$142.80; prisoners' board bill, \$13.45; bill for medical attendance and medicines for city prisoners, \$37.75; janitor and assistant janitor's salary, \$80.

The substitute bill for an ordinance in relation to levying a tax for the improvement of certain sidewalks was taken up, accepted and regularly passed. It provides for the grading, graveling or covering with asphaltum the following sidewalks: The sidewalks on First South, between East and West Temple streets, to be paved with asphaltum, and between West Temple and First West streets to be gravelled. The sidewalks on Second South, between First East and East Temple streets, to be paved with asphaltum. The sidewalks on West Temple, between South Temple and Second South streets, to be gravelled. The sidewalks on First East, between South Temple and Third South streets, to be gravelled. The total estimated cost of this improvement is \$6,703.75, which amount is to be assessed upon the owners of real estate holding property upon said streets, according to the apportionment of the sidewalk commission, viz.: John H. Rumel, Helman Pratt and Adam Spiers. Adjourned for one week.

Quite a number of visitors were present, and the vigor with which the men contested for advantage seemed to interest all. It is safe to assert that anyone in this vicinity who is seeking for a pigeon match will be accommodated by some one of the boys mentioned below.

Official Stone.

Mr. Elias Morris, of the firm of Morris & Evans, has, with characteristic energy, introduced a new artificial stone, and is one of the newest and will probably become one of the most useful of discoveries. A visit to the yard of the firm on Tuesday, showed the men employed in the manufacture of this stone. Its constituents are Portland cement, lime and gravel; and it is made into all desired shapes by means of moulds, into which it is placed where it takes shape, and is then turned out. The men were engaged in turning out stone which is to be used for the new residence of Hon. James Sharp, general freight and ticket agent of the standard gauge lines running north and south from this city. The water table was ready, also the stones for the bay window, window sills, window arches, circular window arches, brackets, corner stones and ornamental work. It can be manufactured in any desired shape, and possesses the hardness and durability of marble, while it is claimed to be much cheaper. Some of it had only been turned out eight or nine days and yet was hard and tough, and Mr. Morris says that this artificial stone possesses such peculiar qualities that it keeps getting harder and harder with age.

Mr. Morris keeps a large number of men at work at one and another of these new industries, and is doing good for the country by the introduction of new, substantial and cheaper articles for general need.
