**IS HE BEEESFORD?**

An English Snob Punished by A California Girl.

New York, 25.—A somewhat sensational episode is reported to have occurred at Cranston's hotel, West Point, last night. The story is that a young man calling him Captain Burslem, and representing himself as an officer in the British army, arrived at the hotel three weeks ago and registered as from Windsor Palace, England. He had been, by a letter of introduction from Grace Greenwood to President Garfield, and made many friends in New York among Wall street brokers, to whom he had been introduced at the Union Club. At the hotel he met a Miss Scoffe, of San Francisco, and daughter of a mine-owner, who was sojourning at West Point with her mother. A few mornings since Burslem, it is stated, in conversation with Miss Scoffe, informed the young lady point blank that she lied and the at once laid the case before the manager of the house, with the statement that a person possessing such characteristics should not be tolerated by the guests. Burslem, however, was too intimate with the hotel proprietor and too firmly supported by the male guests to permit of his being turned away. Last evening Miss Scoffe went with her mother to a cadet hop, and as they were ascending the steps leading to the verandah, the young lady met Burslem, who was leaning against a post smoking. As she attempted to pass he blew a cloud of smoke into her face, and quickly followed it up with another, at the same time snuffing at her discomfiture. Miss Scoffe appealed to the bystanders for protection, but none being offered, she struck the alleged captain full in the face, knocking his cigar from his mouth. She followed this up with a second blow with her fist. Burslem raised his hand, containing a pistol, to ward off the blows, when she caught the stick, and hid it from his grasp and, boiling with rage, struck him squarely in the face several times, cutting him badly. The captain, who has a false leg, was thrown to the piazza in the melee. Later in the evening Mrs. and Miss Scoffe were, it is said, requested to leave the hotel, which they did, coming at once to New York. They are now at the New York Hotel. Burslem claims to have served in the Zulu war, and to have been with the Prince Imperial when the latter died. He says he is a captain in the English army, and is 33 years of age. The English army register shows only one officer of that name, who was commissioned in 1850, and who is retired and now lives in India. Burslem, it is said, has engaged himself to a handsome and rich girl at West Point.

New York, 26.—Public sympathy runs decidedly with the young California lady who chastised the self-styled British Captain Burslem at West Point, for the reason that the immediate provocation for her impulsive act was only the culmination of a persistent series of unmanly and exasperating annoyances previously sustained at his hands. The lady is in great distress because of the unexpected publicity she has achieved, but the general verdict is, served him right.

**Cable Clicks.**

London, 25.—Parnell, in view of the agitation which he intends to set on foot next winter, will issue the *United Irishmen* daily.

London, 26.—The Imperial bank of Germany has raised the rate of discount to 5 per cent, and the rate of interest on advances to 6 per cent.

The *Times*: The opinion in the best informed quarters is that the American gold drain will continue. If it does there can be but little doubt of a further rise in rates for money. It is probable that a further sum of gold will be withdrawn from the bank for America.

Reports from the various parts of the provinces of England state that rain has caused an immense amount of damage to crops and harvest prospects are alarming.

**Mining Decision.**

Washington, 26.—Hon. N. C. McFarland, commissioner of the general land office, to-day, decided the case of the Bodie tunnel company versus the Tioga and Bechtel mining companies of California, in favor of the latter companies. The question decided by the commissioner are: First, that the tunnel company should have commenced a suit in court upon its adverse claim as provided by the general mining law, and that having failed to assert its claim in court, it cannot set it up before the land department in the form of a protest. Second, that the tunnel company having been denied the right to present its claim before the land office, no provision will be inserted in the patents to the Tioga and Bechtel Companies protecting the rights of the tunnel company. Third, one of the Tioga company's locations in the Bodie mining district made in 1876, 600 feet wide, is sustained by the commissioner.

**Fusion Ticket.**

Jackson, Miss., 25.—Republicans, to-day, ratified the greenback nominations and agreed on a fusion ticket of Ben King, for governor, J. B. Zellowly, lieutenant, J. K. Shelman (colored), secretary of state, W. H. Bynam, treasurer, A. T. Winberly, auditor, W. F. Fitzgerald, attorney general, and W. D. House, superintendent of education. The joint mass meeting, to-night, was presided over by John R. Lynch (colored).
