HORRIFYING TO READ.

Five Children Barred to a Crisp.

(Special Telegram)

Stockton, Utah, 27.—The residence of John A. Kimball, Soldier Canyon, about five miles from here, was entirely consumed by fire about 10 o'clock last night, caused by the explosion of a coal oil lamp. Five children, whose ages ranged from 2 months to 13 years perished in the flames. It appears that Mrs. Kimball and her oldest son were in the cook house, about fifty feet from the residence, at the time of the accident, having left the children in charge of a boy 13 years old, who was rocking the cradle, and the wind blowing a perfect gale down the canyon at the time it is thought the lamp was blown from the table to the floor, as the window was open, and exploded and ignited a five gallon can of oil, which was in the room, and the flames spreading so rapidly that the roof burned through and fell in and crushed the inmates and prevented their escape. Nothing but their charred remains, burned beyond recognition, were found this morning. The youngest of the children were twins, in the cradle at the time. The mother of the children is threatened with insanity in consequence of this terrible affair. The coroner will hold an inquest to-day.

A Big Blast.

Messrs. Pitts & Watson put in another big blast in Parley's Canyon, just below Smith's Fork, and astonished themselves at the amount of rock moved. Persons who claim to know say that at least 3,000 tons of rock were raised; but the boys are modest, and say that at least 2,000 tons were scattered around the country. Anyhow the debris closed up the canyon, delaying the stage and other teams. The blast occurred on the Salt Lake and Park City Railroad. Fifteen kegs of powder—375 pounds—were used.

Z. C. M. I. Shoe Factory.

W. H. Rowe, Esq., returned on Friday evening from an extended visit to the Eastern States in the interest of Z. C. M. I. shoe factory and tannery, the object of his visit being to examine into the workings of the shoe and leather business, as carried on in the large manufacturing districts. For this purpose he visited several factories in New York and Massachusetts, the latter region of country being the most profitable to him, as it is the large manufacturing centre of the leather trade. The result of the investigations will, doubtless, be of great benefit to the Institution and the territory generally, because the success of the shoe department will be made still greater by increasing its facilities for filling the wants of the trade with home-made articles, even more than the factory has yet been able to do, though the results of the venture have been very flattering in the past.

Mr. Rowe was very much pleased to find that the system of dividing work, as regards machine work and hand work, pursued here, is almost precisely the same as adopted in the large factories in the east. Some portions of the work continue to be done by hand, which gives greater strength to the goods, and is more satisfactory than if it were all machine work. To obviate the importation of several classes of goods beyond the resources of the factory, still other machinery will doubtless be obtained, and which, of course, will also give employment to more laborers; then the capacity will be largely extended and outside competition will not be feared either in relation to quality of work, or prices at which the goods can be sold.

Southern Railroads.

A few days ago two gentlemen largely interested in railroads touching and intersecting Utah, passed through Ogden on their return west, from Utah. They were Col. L. man Bridges, formerly of Battle Mountain, Nev., Chief Engineer of the California Central railroad, and W. L. French, Esq., one of the directors of the same corporation, for whose line they have been making a preliminary survey. They say the route of this proposed road is from San Francisco south, along the coast to Santa Cruz; thence east, across the State of California, passing through the Yosemite Valley, and entering Nevada about twelve miles from Bodie, thence, across Nevada, to Iron Springs, in southern Utah, where it will connect with the Utah Central. They traveled by wagon over the proposed road from near Bodie to Utah. They say there will be several surveying parties in the field shortly, and several thousand men will be employed grading the road this winter.—Ogden Herald.

CITY ANNOUNCEMENT, 1881

To the Taxpayers of Salt Lake City

In accordance with the provisions of sections 15 and 16 of "An Ordinance to Provide for Assessing and Collecting City Taxes," passed March 12th, 1878, the City Council of Salt Lake City will sit as a Board of Equalization on Monday, August 29th, 1881, at 3 o'clock p.m., in the Council Chamber of the City Hall of said city, "to determine all complaints made in regard to the assessed value of any property," as assessed for city taxes for the year 1881.

During its session said Board will hear and consider any petitions which may be presented to "remit or abate the taxes of any insane, idiotic, infirm or indigent person, to an amount not exceeding five dollars for the current year," agreeable to the provisions of said Ordinance. Let all persons take due notice and govern themselves accordingly.
