CITY COUNCIL.

Proceedings at the City Council on Tuesday evening, September 6th, 1881, Mayor Little presiding:

A petition was submitted from Walker Bros. and 113 others, merchants, business men and firms doing business in the city, calling attention to the necessity of erecting horse cart houses at convenient distances in the business portion of the city, and establishing companies of men to take charge of the same—something like the private department of Messrs. Walker Bros.—so that in case of a fire these horse carts can be there playing on it before the regular department could arrive at the scene of action. The petitioners asked that two or more such horse companies be organized and every facility afforded them by the city to fully equip them to successfully battle with any fire. Petitioners represented that the growth of the city demanded a great improvement in the city fire department, and suggested, for the consideration of the Council, the payment of at least eight men, two of whom shall be foremen, one half to be constantly on watch by day and the other half by night. The petitioners also suggested the advisability of erecting electric fire alarms at convenient places in the city. Referred to the committee on fire department.

Joseph R. Morgan petitioned to be allowed to use a portion of the sidewalk in front of his premises in the Fifteenth Ward for a period of sixty days, while the improvement to his residence was in progress. Granted under the usual restrictions.

John Alfred petitioned to have a foot-bridge placed across a certain dangerous ditch near his residence on the Nineteenth Ward bench. Granted, and supervisor of streets instructed to place a foot-bridge at the locality named, of such dimension as his judgment may determine.

The following bills for the month ending August 31st, 1881, were presented for action: Marshall's expense bills, \$287.15; expenses of fire department, \$144.15; Salt Lake City Gas Company, \$964.58; Andrew Burt, for boarding city prisoners, 1,300 meals at 14c per meal, \$182.70; assistant watermasters, \$385.90; medical attendance, etc., to city prisoners, \$37.75; John Aird, janitor and assistant jailor, \$99; R. B. Williams, collecting dog tax, \$33; James Sheldermine, city weighmaster, \$14.

Two bills for ordinances to license and regulate the sale of spirituous and fermented liquors, which had been prepared by the city attorney, were read and referred to the committee on municipal laws for consideration, and to have thirty copies thereof printed for the use of the Council.

The Council adjourned to tomorrow, Wednesday evening, September 7th, 1881, at 7 o'clock.

Upon adjournment the Council resolved itself into a board of equalization.

New Coal Field.

It has long been known that Utah abounds in coal fields of considerable magnitude, and new discoveries continue to be made at short intervals. A short time ago a new find was made on Price River, Emery County, U. T., which is said to consist of fourteen to fifteen veins, ranging from two to eight feet of solid coal. It is located on the line of the Denver and Rio Grande. The lucky owners are the Black Brothers, of Deseret, who have a contract on the D. and R. G. The quantity in sight seems to be inexhaustible, and the quality is pronounced very superior. The coal in Price River Canyon is very plentiful, and it is understood that every foot of ground is located.

The Ontario Tunnel.

Work on the Ontario Tunnel, Park City, is being pushed ahead rapidly, and it is now in 200 feet. This tunnel has been started below the mill, and will tap the Ontario ledge at a depth of about 600 feet. When finished it will be over 7,000 feet in length. The completion of this work will open up new features in the development of the Ontario Mine, while those who are well posted on the geology of the country through which the tunnel is to anticipate rich strikes of ore bodies north of the old vein. The advantages to be gained by this enterprise cannot be estimated just now, but in the matter of lifting waste and ore, besides pumping, can be readily seen. This tunnel will give an outlet for water to the depth of 600 feet, and the same size pumps which were used in working the mine to the 600 foot level will be sufficient to sink 1,200 feet. It is the intention, however, to put in Cornish plungers. This tunnel, together with the new shaft near the Georgeham famous by the Shaughnessy-Chambers dispute, must drag heavily on the Ontario Company; but a mine yielding \$6,000 per day can stand a good deal of dead work.

Waves of Sand.

Among the many important facts that were brought out by the United States survey of the great lakes and the Mississippi River, is the action of sand waves in the Mississippi, at Helena, which, in water, from three to thirty feet deep are moving down the river at an average rate of eighteen feet a day. These sand waves have an average length, measuring from crest to crest, of about 330 feet, an extreme length of about 600 feet, and an average height of about five feet and an extreme height of about eight feet from valley to crest. The existence of sand waves of such large dimensions, and moving with such velocity, does not seem to have been observed before on the Lower Mississippi.
