GOVERNOR ST. JOHN, of Kansas, at least has the appearance of earnestness in his efforts to enforce the prohibitory liquor law. In a proclamation issued on the 11th instant he offered rewards aggregating \$1,800 for the arrest and conviction of persons violating the law, and the arrest and conviction of city marshals, policemen, sheriffs, constables, prosecuting attorneys failing to perform their duties under the law.

CHRISTMAS SHOPPING.

If one had kept no count of the days and weeks, and seen no almshouses, he could tell this was Christmas time. The shops and stores are literally filled with articles designed especially for sale and service at the merry making time in commemoration of the Birth nearly nineteen hundred years ago, which vouchsafed to man joy, and comfort of heart, and peace of mind here and hereafter for all time. The bangles shine and the gew-gaws glitter from every nook and corner; and of toys for young and old children—for we are all children until after Santa Claus has gone to his northern home—there is bewildering profusion. Of holiday books there is a multitude, each prettier and more appropriate to your special purpose than all the others—when the others are out of sight; but also of the more useful and valuable articles framed, woven and fashioned for Christmas, there is a glorious and expensive abundance.

Two troubles afflict men and women at this time—one, the getting of the money they need to buy all the presents they think they ought to buy, and the other, the selection of the most appropriate articles. The boy who purchases the last jack knife in the store is happy because he feels that he has the best, but if he selects one from a large assortment he forever remains in doubt as to whether his choice was not the very worst that could be made. Nobody should be in doubt as to what is appropriate for the little ones. They want toys and candies, and nuts and things that would be utterly worthless at another time, but are expected from their patron saint. Some parents whose means are limited try to satisfy the little heart by presenting new boots or jackets or hats, but the effort is vain. Better spend half a dollar for nonsense and wait a week or two to get the boy's boots. Utility may be mixed up with Christmas presents in the cases of older and more mature persons, but the juveniles have little idea of economy or of making ends meet, and it seems cruel to spoil a Christmas to

give them their first lesson. They will learn soon enough, and have to practice it long enough.

But discrimination is necessary with older people. Utility is not so essential in the article presented as appropriateness. The cost is something that the recipient of the gift will never think of, for if he be worthy of the present, and it is appropriate, it will be as dear to him if it costs only a trifle as if a fortune were spent in it. A Christmas gift ought to be a token of love and friendship, and he who offers it in any other spirit, or accepts it with other feelings does not understand the meaning of Christmas.

Out of the multitude of holiday goods displayed, it would be a strangely abnormal fancy that could not be satisfied, in the matters of cost and the tastes of friends; and the evidences presented in crowded shops and stores, and the activity of salesmen is that everybody, old and young, has something in store for him on Christmas day.

THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES has postponed consideration of the Utah delegate contest until after the holiday recess. If this suspense continues much longer Miser Campbell's heart will be brokeo. This thing of putting his hand down into his pocket for money to pay hotel bills, with little hope of ever drawing the delegate's salary is said to be driving the fellow to insanity. One of these days he will tell the governor and the half dozen fellows who are urging him on, to go to thunder with the delegateship, and he will return to his cheap fare of bacon and bread.

GUITEAU FILLS the void which was created by the postponement of his trial until Wednesday, by coming to the newspapers with a long statement and expression of his ideas as to the trial and the men engaged in it. He still insists that the Deity is responsible for the President's murder, having urged the assassin on to the deed. When the hemp begins to tighten about Guiteau's neck he will probably change his mind in regard to the Deity, and conclude that the Lord is not going about inciting hungry, disappointed office seekers to murder.
