THE IRISH.

Latest News from the Disturbed Island.

London, 2.—At a meeting of Ennis-town commissioners, yesterday, a letter from Herbert Gladstone was read, stating that according to official information, crime is decreasing in the proclaimed districts, and the authorities expect the repressive measures will shortly be abandoned.

Dublin, 2.—The president, secretary and treasurer of the Ladies' League at Roscommon have been arrested. The three ladies arrested at Dejnmallogher have been liberated on bail.

Dublin, 3.—Archbishop Croke, of Cashel, bitterly complains of the police intruding into the parochial residence on the occasion of the watch meeting in connection with the New Year, although they were assured it was not a League meeting.

The speakers at the great land owners' meeting here, to-day, include the Earl of Derby, Marquis of Waterford, Earl of Westmeath, Baron Ardillan and other important political personages.

Six thousand persons are present at the landlords' meeting here, to-day, which is the most influential ever held. Earl Donoghue, Earl Carris, Marquis of Bedford, Kingbaron, and all the principal representatives of the landed interest are in attendance.

London, 3.—Patrick Hart, a returned Irish-American, has been arrested at Carrigot Hill under the coercion act.

New Orleans, La., 2.—Leopold Mayer, a native of Germany, well known in California, where he resided 22 years, committed suicide here to-day.

Springfield, Mo., 3.—During a quarrel between two little children, named Williams and Gates, aged 7 and 5 years, respectively, the younger of the two seized a revolver belonging to one of the older members of the family and discharged the weapon at his little adversary, killing him instantly.

Ellsworth, Kansas, 3.—W. E. Graham, who killed, robbed and burned Phillip Egle, at Venado, Ellsworth County, on the night of the 21st, was hung by a mob in front of the court house last night.

Vienna, 2.—The Jewish committee state that twelve Jews were killed in the riots at Warsaw, and sixty-three wounded.

Graham, Texas, 3.—The three McDonald Brothers, murderers of a man named Martin, at Bell's, made a desperate effort to escape from jail yesterday, which resulted in their death, and that of a deputy sheriff, besides seriously wounding several other people.

Chicago, 2.—Thomas Somerville, a peacemaker, Switzer, shot dead Jimmie O'Brien, a watchman on the railroad at Sixteenth street, to night. O'Brien sought the quarrel. His friend, Victor Diselmone, got a shot from Somerville also, but was not killed.
