GUITEAU SITUATION.

Facts and Figures in the Case.

Jacksonville, Ill., 2.—Dr. Andrew McFarland, a prominent expert in insanity matters, has been subpoenaed to testify in the Guiteau case, and started east this morning.

Washington, 2.—The anti-room at the jail was filled to-day with people patiently waiting to be conducted to Guiteau's cell. In accordance with his own request only those whom the jail officers knew were taken to the cell. He gave his autograph to almost every visitor.

In reference to recent publications concerning the question of jurisdiction, the prisoner remarked, "the Lord had a special object in letting the president down so early from Long Branch instead of Washington." Some visitor remarking that the court might move the dock to the basement he said, "I don't care where they put me, I have a good voice."

A new arrangement has been made by which Guiteau has to subsist on ordinary fare. Heretofore when meat has been sent to the prison from the outside it was the strict rule of the jail officers not to touch them in any way. Had anything happened to the prisoner the jail officials could not have been held accountable.

Seville has now thrown the responsibility of the food and of visitors upon the warden of the jail. He no longer issues passes or requests to officers to admit parties to the jail. Guiteau is not to receive his letters any more and is not to be supplied with newspapers.

Guiteau's sanity and love of notoriety have been well fed the last few days. He has had a great number of callers at the jail, the majority of whom are glibly admitting for this atrocious wretch, who apparently has not the slightest realization of the situation he is in, and the fact that he has but a short time to live.

Mr. Seville knows the situation, and his refusal, yesterday, to send any more letters shows that he does not mean to be responsible for the insanity of a prisoner. John Guiteau, in an interview to-day, said the prisoner received about 300 letters a day. They are no longer sent to him. We have not time to read them. There are many other important things to do. It would not be proper, of course, to send them to him. Allowing him to hold letters, read papers, see letters, send out letters, and things of that sort, is right in principle. A prisoner so situated might get up a conspiracy. Of course, there is nothing of that kind to be feared in this case.

What is your opinion as to the result of the trial? I believe the jury will convict him, sane or insane. I have always told our people so. The tendency of this expert testimony has been very strong against him. These gentlemen have the theory that the case is insanity without disease. All knew as soon as they came here and began to ask whether he had been sick or not, what their testimony would be. These gentlemen are honest in their theory, but their theory is wrong. They are partisan defenders of a new idea. When sharp lawyers began to gain acquittals on the ground of emotional insanity and monomania, experts got together and decided that the brain must be found to be diseased in order to establish insanity. It is a theory.

Washington, 3.—It is understood that the defense in the Guiteau case will shortly introduce the new feature of so-called "cranks," numbering between forty and fifty, arrested here since Guiteau shot the President. Most of them were sent to St. Elizabeth Insane Asylum on physicians' certificates. The physicians in each case will, it is said, be subpoenaed for the purpose of comparing those cases with Guiteau, with the view of demonstrating that if the commitments referred to were justly made, Guiteau must be likewise insane.

Admission of Territories. Washington, 3.—A correspondent interviewed Springer. I suppose you democrats will fight the admission of Dakota as a state? "Yes," replied Springer. "I shall oppose it in any way. Utah is more fit and better equipped every way than Dakota, but I shall object to the admission of any territories as states until the boundaries of population become filled. I should oppose the admission of Utah, New Mexico and Arizona just as seriously, although we would get democratic senators from these states. I think we ought to wait until this western country is sufficiently developed for us to determine what will be the probable character and density of population, and tell better where to put the boundaries and how much territory they ought to contain. We made a mistake, you see, in admitting both Colorado and Nevada. Nevada is too small and should never have been made a state. Still, in order to take population enough to make the boundaries of Colorado too extensive. There is the same trouble with Dakota. We don't know yet what she is going to amount to, and so can we wait. Her people are just as well off under the present form of government. I do not think she will be admitted."

Vouching for Sherman. Chicago, 2.—Washington special: Senator Sherman's friends have implicit confidence in the result of the investigation into the disbursements of the contingent fund now in progress by the Senate committee. Said a prominent Ohioan, to-day: "I have known John Sherman in public and private life for over a quarter of a century, and you set it down that he will never be convicted of petty larceny. His hands will be found clean, and no amount of investigation can hurt him."

The Public Debt. Washington, 3.—The debt statements show a decrease of the public debt during December '81, to \$8,127,936.23. Cash in the treasury, \$293,377,980; gold certificates, \$5,188,120; silver certificates, \$68,675,230; certificates of deposit outstanding, \$9,590,000; refunding \$575,250; legal tenders outstanding, \$348,651,616; fractional currency, \$7,075,028; decrease since June 30th, 1881, \$75,107,624.

Rabbit Dog Chicago, 1.—Considerable excitement was occasioned this afternoon on North Clark and Chicago avenue at the appearance of a rabbit Newfoundland dog with a large piece of rope about his neck. He bit several persons in a vicious way, and was finally dispatched by a policeman's revolver. The bites upon four persons were characterized as a drug store, but a considerable number of other persons known to have been bitten have not reported.

Cable Clunks.

Berlin, 2.—The statement that Bismarck intended to propose a congress of the powers to discuss the question of the Pope's position is denied. A proposal to re-establish the Pope's responsibility has been simply suggested, semi-officially. No reply is yet received.

Emperor William received congratulations from the czar on the advent of the new year, and on the seventy-fifth anniversary of his entrance into the army. The officers of the army celebrated the anniversary in an enthusiastic manner.

Paris, 2.—Evening journals deny that negotiations for an Anglo-French commercial treaty have been broken off.

Lisbon, 2.—King Luis opened the Cortes to-day.

Athens, 2.—Elections have been held and the returns still incomplete are unfavorable to government. The ministers of marine and finance lost their seats, a surprise to government.

St. Petersburg, 3.—It is understood that at the beginning of the Russian New Year the state police department will be withdrawn from the control of the minister of the interior and placed under the special direction of General Tchernev. A more vigorous administration is looked for.

Cape Town, 3.—J. F. Burgers, ex-president of the old Transvaal republic, is dead.

St. Petersburg, 3.—China has paid the first installment of the compensation to Russia, stipulated in the Kuldsji treaty.

Paris, 3.—The Bourne says the banking firm of J. J. Pignatelli, of Bordeaux, which failed recently was really a company formed by a combination of bankers, with a capital stock of 5,000,000 francs of which 3,000,000 francs were lost. The other liabilities are still unknown. The failure was caused by that of Charriot, of Bordeaux and Calcutta.

Madrid, 3.—The operation for the conversion of privileged debts into 4 per cent, succeeded beyond expectation. About \$3,000,000 sterling of the debt has been converted.

Vienna, 2.—The press reports that in an encounter between six gen d'armes and sixty Knivoscians, four gen d'armes were killed and horribly mutilated, and a number wounded. The Knivoscians were overpowered.

Small Pox. Chicago, 2.—Small pox is on the decrease now. The cases have run down from an average of fifteen cases per day, during the first of December, to an average of four in the latter part. There have been 30,000 free vaccinations during December, and arrangements are made for 50,000 in January.

Springfield, Ill., 2.—Ten cases of small pox in two families at Woodlawn, and sporadic cases from other sections.

Chicago, 2.—No deaths or new cases of small pox. One of the victims grew delirious last night, and in some way escaped from the pest house and came into the city, a distance of three miles, very thinly clad.

Number is Hot. Rome, 3.—Opinion says: King Humbert, when receiving New Year congratulations of senators and members of the Chamber of Deputies, said with evident allusion to Bismarck's reported designs in behalf of the Vatican, that Italy was resolved to respect all governments, and had no reason to believe any one had been wanting in respect to her, but it was well to make known that she was firmly decided not to admit the slightest discussion of certain questions touching the internal order of the capitan frasca. King Humbert also dwelt upon the necessity of the completion of the military organization. The King's words produced a great impression.

Council Bluffs' Crow. Council Bluffs, 2.—One million two hundred thousand dollars was spent in improvements in the city the past year. Wholesale business increased 33 per cent. Railroad business nearly doubled. The Union Pacific sent 74,750 cars of through freight west, and 28,896 east. The ticket sales at the Union Pacific depot alone aggregated \$771,949, exclusive of the sales at local offices of the various companies.

Civil Rights. St. Louis, 3.—Rev. Richard Cain, (colored) Bishop of Texas and Louisiana, and his wife, Laura Cain, have brought suit in the United States circuit court at San Antonio, Texas, against the Galveston, Houston and Louisiana Railroad Company for \$20,000 damages for being refused the privilege of riding in a first-class coach after the company had sold them first-class tickets.

Fire Record. New York, 3.—The old Vanderbilt homestead, Staten Island, burned this morning.

Marshall, Texas, 3.—The depot, boarding house, baggage and express office, etc., of the Texas Pacific Railroad, burned. Loss, \$30,000.

New York, 3.—The cracker bakery of Hatfield & Ducker, Brooklyn, burned to-day. Lost, \$75,000; insurance, \$45,000.

Over the Mourning Period. Washington, 2.—The arrival of the New Year and the throwing open of the White House has broken the season of universal mourning in Washington society over President Garfield, which every one has desired to break, and society will resume its sway now.

Female Clerks Must Go. New York, 2.—Time's Washington: There is quite a flutter among those clerks, mostly women, in the treasury department, who are carried on what is called the "lapse fund," as it has been discovered since Folger came in, that that fund has been overdrawn, and it has been ordered that employees on the lapse fund roll shall be dropped until the amount overdrawn shall be made up.

The Stocumb Law. Omaha, 3.—The Stocumb high license liquor law went into effect in the city, to-day, under municipal dictation, with the results of suspending 108 out of 140 saloons. There are indications that the law will be satisfactorily complied with.

More British Vengeance. London, 2.—Private intelligence has been received at Liverpool that the governor of the gold coast is about to march with a force of native troops. The object of the expedition is the punishment of natives in Danne for killing two English customs officers. Hot work is anticipated.
