CITY COUNCIL. Proceedings at the City Council, Tuesday evening, January 3d, 1882, Mayor Little presiding: A petition was submitted from F. Kesler and forty-one others, residents of the Fifteenth and Sixteenth Wards, asking for repairs to South Temple street between Fifth and Seventh West streets, as in wet weather it was almost impassable for teams, etc. Granted, and supervisor of streets instructed to make the necessary repairs to said street in the order of business.

Henry Shingleton petitioned for the transfer of the unexpired portion of his license to do business as a merchant to Mr. Butler. Granted. William Peterson, one of the sufferers from the recent fire on First South street, being present, petitioned verbally to be allowed to put up temporary wooden studding to support a fire-proof metallic roof until the weather will permit him to construct the fire-proof walls required by ordinance. The petition was received, and Mr. Peterson allowed the usual privilege of using a portion of the street and sidewalk fronting his premises whereon to place building material, and also to make any temporary arrangements necessary to the resumption of his business, for the period of not to exceed four months.

A petition was presented from James T. Little and LeGrande Young, representing that in the summer of 1873 or 1874 they purchased of the city, through its agent, Mr. Isaac Groo, what they supposed to be blocks 185, 186, 187 and 188, in plat "D," Salt Lake survey. That they went upon the land they intended to purchase with the agent and selected the same, and paid for what they supposed to be said blocks, but that said agent by oversight and mistake, delivered to petitioners the certificate of survey for blocks 190, 191, 192 and 193, instead of those aforesaid. The petitioners therefore asked that they be allowed to purchase the land they contracted for and to pay for the same at a fair price, or that an exchange be made so as to enable them to obtain the land they before intended to get. A plat of the blocks in question accompanied the petition. Referred to the committee on public grounds.

The committee on finance, to whom was referred the City Treasurer's report for the fiscal year ending November 30, 1881, reported that they had examined the same, found it correct and destroyed the redeemed auditor's warrants. The following bills for the month ending December 31st, 1881, were submitted for action and allowed: Expenses of fire department, \$143.40; prisoners board bill, \$316.24; medical attendance, etc., to prisoners, \$37.75; janitor City Hall and assistant janitor, \$60.

The following bills were also allowed: David James for one fire on the hearth stove, fitted and placed in large room up stairs, City Hall, with furnishings complete, \$108; Midgley & Sons, for calomining and repairs at City Hall, \$54.25; Abram Gould, for two car loads of coal, \$110.

An appropriation of \$35 was made to pay six months' interest on a corporation note for \$1,000, at 7 per cent, per annum.

A bill for an ordinance authorizing the City Recorder to appoint a deputy was presented, duly considered, passed and referred for enrollment and publication. Adjourned for one week.

Highway Robbery. The festive garrotter has again found Salt Lake and begun operations. Mr. Grow reached town from Tintic on Monday, having disposed of his business at the latter place, the proceeds being the money taken from him. He has the impression that the robbers are acquaintances or others who heard of his coming and hid in wait for him.

The smoke arising from the structure north of the graveyard indicates that work is still being maintained on the artesian well. John W. Lowell, Esq., the popular dealer in wagons and farm implements has returned from his trip east, and looks and feels well.

Mr. O. S. Walsh has now added a stove department to his rapidly increasing business—that of a dealer in and manufacturer of tin, copper and brass ware. The funeral services over the remains of the late Robert Williams will be held on Thursday, that day having been set to give time for the return of Mr. Williams' son from Montana.

The loss by the fire on Monday is somewhere in the vicinity of \$12,000. The debris was being reviewed on Tuesday, and some if not all of the buildings will be replaced after their former style.
