TELEGRAPHIC NEWS

Township Survey Swindles. Washington, 25.—Senator Van Wyck, of Nebraska, to-day submitted the following: Resolved, That the secretary of the interior be directed, through the commissioner of the land office, to instruct the surveyor general to approve no more applications for surveys under the deposit system, and that all proceedings be suspended under the applications already approved, until further action by Congress, so that contracts unlawfully procured may not be recognized as valid.

Cabinet Charter. New York, 27.—The Graphic's Washington correspondent says: Some friends of the President state that he will make important appointments next week, the chief of which will be two of the cabinet, and that Booth is talked of for the secretaryship of the interior. Booth's friends claim that he is stronger on the Pacific Coast than Barge. These friends do not say what the President thinks of the proposition; and so far as known, consideration of the matter is confined chiefly to persons who don't have the making of cabinet officers. Barge's friends do not seem to be disturbed about the report. They say Millar has reason to be assured that he will be appointed. Logan is said to have expressed confidence that Sargent would not be appointed. Logan endorses Chaffee, but it is believed he stands no chance.

No More Giteau Literature. Washington, 27.—Scoville and Warden Crocker had a discussion at the jail yesterday, as to the propriety of allowing Giteau's address to go out. Scoville at first opposed, but finally yielded in this instance. He said as long as the papers will print Giteau's screeds, he fancies he has the ear of the press; that he is superior to his counsel and can manage the case entirely in his own way, while as a matter of fact, he is indebted to his own utterances for yesterday's verdict. Warden Crocker suggested, "If you will not supply him with any more stationery, I will see that he does no more writing." It was finally settled between counsel and the warden that for the next week no one shall be permitted to interview the prisoner and that no communication shall go to the public.

The Chinese Bill. Washington, 27.—The Post this morning contains the following editorial paragraph, concerning the bill which was reported yesterday from the Senate committee on foreign relations: The bill Senator Miller, of California, has introduced for prohibiting Chinese immigration is what might be termed "therapeutic." It prohibits so severely that the tendency will be, if it is adopted, to neglect his enforcement. There may be men on the Pacific Coast who can out-Keasney Kearney on the Chinese question. It is to be hoped the republican senator from California is not one of them.

Criminal Calendar. Burlington, Ia., 27.—J. A. Heiden, of Wapella, Louisa County, this state, fatally shot his wife yesterday, and ended his own existence by putting a bullet through his head. Nothing as to the motive is known beyond the fact that the couple had been unhappy together. Lafayette, Ind., 27.—The community is excited by learning that a dancing bear, which had been in charge of two Italians, escaped just outside the city, and was killed by a family it attacked. The Italians are missing and it is feared both were killed.

American Matters. E. Hotville, O., 26.—The body of a stranger lies unburied since Tuesday, because the town and county authorities disagreed as to who should bear the expense of the interment. New York, 27.—A furious wind storm cut off telegraphic communication with the interior of the state. At Syracuse a schoolhouse was blown down. Ottawa, 27.—The deadlock continues. Adjourned till Monday. Burlington, Vt., 27.—A severe gale struck the city this morning, doing great damage in small amounts. Washington, 27.—The President has nominated John Campbell for surveyor of customs at Omaha.

The "Jeannette" Survivors. Washington, 27.—Secretary Hunt received the following cablegram from Yakutsk, Siberia, January 7th, via Irkutsk: Hunt, Sec'y of the Navy Washington: Telegram received; every effort is making to find the missing men. Melville, with two men and the Russian authorities, go forth. Danenhauer and nine men to the Atlantic seaboard. Report sent by mail. (Signed) MELVILLE.

Fire Record. Philadelphia, 26.—The Keystone wheel factory of Chas. Scott, Canal street, burned. Loss \$100,000; insurance \$45,000. Burlington, Vt., 26.—The overturning of a ladle of molten metal in Brink's foundry, burned the building and fatally burned four men, during the period of sixty days. Philadelphia, 27.—Lost by the fire in the Keystone Hub, shoe and wheel works, one-third insured.

Beecher Jokes. New York, 26.—Henry Ward Beecher, at a dinner of the stationers' board of trade, said speaking of Giteau's case: "I think the man who received an inspiration from Heaven, will also have a line dropped to him from the same direction."

The Reapportionment. Washington, 27.—The House committee on census, virtually agreed to increase the number of representatives from the state of Illinois from twenty to twenty-one, which will make the total number of representatives 320, instead of 319 as proposed by McCord.
