RACE TALK.
\$10,000 Can be Secured for a Sea-
son's Sport.

A meeting of the directors of the
Salt Lake Driving Park Association
will be held to-day, at 11 o'clock, at
the Clift House. There is some
talk of endeavoring to get the track
into the National Association in
order that they may have a good
standing. The prospects for a sea-
son's racing are splendid. It is
stated now that whatever turn mat-
ters may take there will be plenty of
racing here this summer. A num-
ber of Salt Laker are now figuring
to attend the races at Denver, which
take place in May, and there is a
movement on foot to offer inducements
to Denver men to come here and
race afterwards. If the track
here can be secured there are reliable
parties who are willing to offer
\$10,000 in purses for five or six days'
racing in June next, and have made
informal propositions to that effect
to the Driving Park Association.
They would then throw the races
open to all comers, from all
countries, so far as the
money offered would be an
inducement. If good horses
are brought here, and Salt Laker
are not able to compete, then sport-
ing men here say they are prepared
to get horses which can compete.
If the Driving Park Association is
unwilling to lease the track, or let
it temporarily, then those here will
race anyhow; but it seems as if it
would be the wiser plan to lease it
to reliable men, who are willing to
offer purses and see that fair play
wins.
The two horses purchased by
Colonel Shaughnessy on Thursday
will be brought here, and if they
prove to be too many for the ani-
mals now here, there are Salt Lake
men with sufficient money, who say
they will secure horses that can go
against the stallions, and make it
interesting for them. Colonel
Shaughnessy has also purchased
and will bring on a couple of other
horses, but whether runners or trot-
ters is not stated.

In the matter of running horses,
there must now be about twenty-
five in this country, and prospective
accessions. At the directors meet-
ing, to-day, it may be decided
whether we will have many interest-
ing races or not this season.
