Coming Hebrews.

Vienna, 18.—Two hundred Jewish refugees passed through Lemburg on Sunday on their way to America. Two hundred more are expected on Monday from Brady.

Dr. Lamson.

London, 18.—The Manchester Guardian, speaking of Dr. Lamson, says: Enough has been shown to prepare us to hear, without surprise, that Sir Wm. Harcourt and the authorities do not see their way towards authorizing the execution of a man concerning whose moral responsibility so great doubt can be shown.

Suicide.

St. Louis, Mo., 18.—Henry King, a middle-aged German, dependent from poor collections during the day, announced that he was going to shoot himself, and eluding his friends finally, who followed him 4 miles to the cemetery, blew out his brains, standing on the grave of his oldest child.

On the War Path.

San Francisco, 19.—Tucson dispatch: A special to the Citizen from Camp Thomas, says the chief of police at San Carlos has been killed by Indians, and fears are entertained for all the employes. Colonel Schofield with two companies of the Sixth Cavalry, has left for their rescue. Loco's band is on the war path.

Russian Racket.

St. Petersburg, 18.—The Galos publishes accounts confirming the reports of anti-Jewish riots in the district of Kheron. A Jew was killed at Dubdsee. The troops at Navaja Praga had been reinforced by local levies from Elizabeth Grad. It is stated the Czar has accepted the offer of the nobility of St. Petersburg and Moscow to protect the Imperial family and maintain order at the coronation.

The Shipper Business.

Washington, 18.—Shipper declined to state the price paid for the Gochet claim, or whether it was purchased from legitimate heir, or whether Norvin Green, Wm. H. Vanderbilt, E. D. Morgan, Joseph Medill and others mentioned in the list he gave Harbut, were stockholders, or whether Senator Blair or Cragin are stockholders. He refused to say who are directors of the company who give any information about the present personnel of the company.

Alleged Election Frauds

Charleston, 19.—In the United States circuit court, to-day, the grand jury returned a true bill against Henry O. Dickinson, and others of Barrow County, charged with conspiracy to intimidate United States witnesses. The grand jury was composed of thirteen republicans and seven democrats. The court then commenced the trial of the managers of the election at Marysville precinct, Sumner County, charged with stuffing the ballot boxes and interfering with the United States supervisor. The jury consists of eleven republicans and one democrat. The testimony began at once.

THE "RODGERS" BURNT.

Another Arctic Crew in Distress.

New York, 18.—The following is a special cable message to the Herald: IAKUTSK, SIBERIA, April 18, 1882.

I have this morning received startling news from Mr. Jackson, the special commissioner who was sent in search of the Jeannette survivors. He apparently forwarded the dispatch by courier. It ran as follows:

FROM THE BANKS OF ALDEN RIVER, April 6, 1882.

I have just met a courier bearing dispatches from W. H. Gilder, Herald correspondent with the Rodgers, whom the courier had accompanied from Kolgmsk, on the Kolembe river, to Yarkutsk, 400 miles north of Yakutsk. Gilder had made the journey of 2,000 versts among the Chukches. He was sent forward with news that the Rodgers had been burned and sunk; that Lieut. Berry, with the officers and crew, thirty-six in number, were at Tlopkra, near Cape Sardinia, and that a vessel should be sent for them as early as possible.

Capital Notes.

Washington, 18.—The President sent a message to Congress urging the appropriation of a million dollars for the Mississippi river.

The House Committee on Territories agreed to report favorably to the House the bill providing for the organization of the judicial district of Alaska and the establishment of civil government.

President Arthur gave a reception at the Executive Mansion to-night to the diplomatic corps and members of the House and Senate. The President was assisted in the reception by Mrs. Folger, Mrs. Brewster, Mrs. Frelinghuysen, Mrs. Chandler, and Mrs. Sellier.

The House, to-day, on motion of Representative George, of Oregon, took from the Speaker's table and passed the senate bill creating a new collection district of Yakima.

The wife and daughter of Minister Sargent held an informal reception at the Regis House, this afternoon, which was attended by a very large number of ladies and gentlemen prominent in Washington social and political circles who called to bid the minister and his family good-bye and bon voyage. They leave Washington next Thursday for Massachusetts and sail for Germany on the 29th ultimo.

Washington, 19.—The United States consul at Valparaiso telegraphed that the officials who opened letters addressed by the state department here to the United States legation at Lospaz have been arrested and punished.

Chicago, 18.—Journal's Washington: The case of Hallett Kilbourne against the government for \$2,000,000 damages for imprisonment by the Sergeant-at-arms Thompson is being heard in the United States Court to-day.

J. Stanley Brown has returned from Cleveland and reports Mrs. Garfield and family well and cheerful.

Florence, the actor, visited the President to day and is confident of his appointment as consul to Ecken, the Hagar, or to Copenhagen.

Miscellaneous Matters.

St. Louis, 18.—Jay Gould and family left for Kansas City this morning enroute for Nebraska.

New York, 18.—William Sindram, under sentence to be hanged on Friday next, was denied a new trial.

Chicago, 18.—Budd Doble and Hugh White of California, have bought of Col. Conley, of this city, the celebrated stallion "Monroe Chief," with a record of 2.18 1/4. The terms are private. He will probably be trotted in two or three races this season, and then go into the stud.

Portland, Me., 18.—Rev. Samuel G. Fessenden, representative from Maine in the Thirty-seventh Congress, died to-day.

Columbus, Ohio, 18.—Col. Ozro and Doda of Cincinnati, ex-member of Congress, died at the Neil House this evening.

Detroit, 19.—Chas. R. Plunkett, an old and widely known theatrical manager, died at the Brunswick hotel this morning, aged 59.

Baltimore, 19.—Jere S. Black, delivered an oration at the Grailaw Centennial to-night. He held that America had been insulted by England's late conduct.

New York, 19.—Edward J. Wambold, a well known negro minstrel, died yesterday.

Albany, 19.—Judge Westbrook publishes a card vindicating himself from the charge under legislative investigation, of venality connected with the devalued road cases.

New Orleans, 19.—Judge Pades has just filed a bill establishing the disputed contract of the Pullman company with the Texas Pacific Railway Company, as a valid, and binding contract upon the Railroad Company for the unexpired term of nine years.

Raleigh, N. C., 19.—The state republican executive committee favors an alliance with the liberal movement, and has called a state convention for June 15th. The anti-prohibition committee is called to meet on May 24.

Fire Record

Cairo, Ill., 18.—Holiday's box factory burned. Loss \$25,000. A small boy is reported burned to death.

New Alexandria, Pa., 18.—The fire was controlled at 11 last night, after seven hours were burned. One third of the town is gone. Loss, \$25,000.

Pottsville, Pa., 18.—Mountain fires are raging near New Philadelphia, the engine house of Silver Creek Colliery is gone. People are fighting the flames to-night to save the breaker.

Rye Beach, 18.—Loss by fire, \$50,000.

Lawrenceburg, Ind., 18.—Fire here to-night destroyed three places of business, the post office and two dwellings. Loss, \$25,000.
