New York, 23.—The Times says that Colonel Mapleson has engaged Adeline Patti for the next opera season in this country. Cohoes, 24.—Harmony mills are closed and 5,500 persons are out of employment. San Francisco, 23.—The steamer Corwin has sailed for the Arctic for the relief of the crew of the Rodgers.

Criminal Calendar.

Louisville, 23.—Wm. Hewitt, marshal of Nortonville, shot and mortally wounded one Manser, and killed his son. The marshal recently arrested Manser on the charge of gambling, and the parties meeting at a place called Trade Water, to-day, the father and son attacked Hewitt, who shot them in self-defence.

John Russell Young.

New York, 24.—Hon. John Russell Young, minister to China, was presented with a set of congratulatory resolutions by a committee of the New York Press Club to-day.

What Enterprise Gets.

Philadelphia, 24.—A correspondent of the New York Herald was held in \$10,000 bonds on the charge of libel, in publishing Mortimer's statement that Senator McPherson was interested in the Peruvian company.

Incendiarism.

Titusville, Pa., 23.—Incendiarism made an ineffectual attempt last night to burn Cochran, a thriving village on Franklin branch. Fires were lighted in Birchard's cooper shops and planing mill. The town escaped with a loss of \$5,000 on Birchard's mill. Great excitement prevails.

Sulzer Eugene.

Marsailles, 23.—Suit was opened on Saturday against the corporation of Marsailles against ex-Empress Eugenie, to compel her to relinquish the imperial chateau, presented under the empire to the Emperor by the municipality, which, according to the mayor, now belongs to the town.

Railway Magnates.

Cleveland, Ohio, 24.—General Manager Cooper, accompanied by Vice President James F. Clark, of the New York, Pennsylvania and Ohio, and a party of four others, left in a private car last night for California. They go by the Rock Island, Union Pacific and Central Pacific, and will be absent about two months.

Anti-Chinese.

Chicago, 24.—A large anti-Chinese meeting was held yesterday at Greenbaum's hall. Wm. Peterson and Wm. Lewis were the speakers, and resolutions denouncing Mayor Harrison were adopted, because he had stifled free speech while presiding at a former meeting.

The Jews.

London, 24.—Fifty Jewish refugees from Russia called on Saturday for the United States.

Washington, 24.—The Supreme Court in banc decided to hear argument on the bill on May 8. The portion of Scoville's letter announcing his withdrawal from the case, was read.
