The Star Routes.

Washington, D.C.—In the Star Route trial this morning, Hinkley, of counsel for the defense, proceeded with his arguments.

The court inquired whether Hinkley was not a little premature in making his argument, no motion pro or con having been entered as to Turner, nor had the jury found a verdict acquitting him.

Hinkley—"Mr. Merrick discharged him from the case."

The Court—"No."

Mr. Hinkley—"He said what is equivalent, that he would ask the jury to return no verdict against Turner."

The court—"Turner is entitled to have a verdict from the jury. That verdict has not yet been rendered and he is still on trial, and for aught the court can know judicially, the jury may find him guilty. Would not the proper time for this argument be upon a motion for arrest of judgment?"

Hinkley—"My object now is to persuade the court to instruct the jury that if they find Turner not guilty, they must find the others not guilty."

Hinkley argued that Turner was an essential part of the scheme of the indictment as was Brady.

The court—"I do not see that."

Hinkley said he did not contend that the indictment might have been framed leaving out Turner completely, but according to the pending indictment, when the counsel for the government said "omit Turner," the law said "omit Turner."

Hinkley then began his address to the jury. Before addressing the jury he called the attention of the court to the scheme of the indictment. The government had conceded that the branch of the conspiracy which in the indictment had been attributed to Turner was not sustained by proof, and he argued that Turner and Turner's performance were a necessary part of the scheme of the indictment, and that if the case had failed as to him it had failed as to all. He gave notice that he would present a prayer to that effect.

Miscellaneous Matters.

Kansas City, 31.—Grain men comment on the fact that shipments of wheat have been made from here directly to St. Paul and Minneapolis for milling. Over a million bushels have already gone, and a quarter of a million more is contracted for.

New York, 31.—Two foreign houses say the largest shipment of American securities in a year will be made on Saturday's steamer. The buying is thought to have been sufficient to avert gold shipments.

It is said on good authority that the statement of the Western Union receipts for the twelve months just ended shows the gross earnings were seventeen million dollars against fourteen million dollars for the twelve months preceding. The net earnings are alleged to show a corresponding increase, making over 8 per cent. for the year on the stock.

Washington, 31.—The next two months government will disburse forty-two million dollars in pensions and the payment of the bonded debt.

The public debt decreased about sixteen million dollars during the month. Cleveland, 31.—The tariff commission opened this morning and heard the hoop iron case stated by J. D. Weeks and T. H. Wells.

A communication was read from Maxwell Woodhull, of Fargo, Dakota, forwarding and endorsing the petition of the northwestern farmers, that steam plows and tackle be admitted free for five years. The commission meet to-morrow at Detroit.

Cincinnati, 31.—Holden & Timberlake, grain dealers, have suspended. Liabilities only fifteen thousand dollars. The decline of grain was the cause.

For Yellowstone Park.

Washington, 31.—A couple of Dakota men are negotiating, with fair prospects of success, with Acting Secretary Joslyn, of the interior department, for the necessary grounds in the Yellowstone Park upon which to construct roadways and erect hotels and other buildings for the accommodation and convenience of visitors.

Acting Secretary Joslyn will to-morrow sign a covenant for the leasing of such portions of the Yellowstone Park property as may be requisite for the erection of hotels and other buildings necessary for the accommodation of visitors to the park. The lease is made to private individuals who propose to establish a company to secure articles of incorporation and supply visitors to the Park with hotel accommodations, telegraphic facilities, transportation and guides. The parties known in the transaction are Messrs. Hobarland Douglas, of Dakota, and the term of the lease is 10 years. Rent to be paid has not yet been finally determined upon, and will be fixed by the secretary at a further conference with the lessees to-morrow. The contract will expressly stipulate that persons entering upon the leased lands will subject themselves to the regulations governing other portions of the park, and that the scale of prices to be charged for transportation through the park for guides, etc., shall be subject to the approval of the secretary.

Political.

Chicago, 31.—Des Moines special: The republicans of the Tenth congressional district nominated A. G. Holmes on the first ballot. The convention was at Webster City.

Cleveland, 31.—Judge Wm. H. Brown has consented to run as an independent democrat in the Sixteenth district, there being much dissatisfaction over the methods by which Beat H. Wilkins was nominated by the regular convention.

Indianapolis, 31.—Thomas S. Ward was nominated for congress by the republicans of the Ninth district at Tipton to-day.

Danville, Va., 31.—George O. Cabell has been nominated to Congress by the democrats in the Fifth District.

St. Louis, 31.—The republicans of the Tenth District have nominated W. J. Terrill for Congress.

DeLesseps.

London, 31.—DeLesseps has arrived at Naples; he refuses to accept a bank at Paris offered. French newspapers are declaring that the Suez Canal Company always will remain aloof from politics.
