Fire at Evanston.

On Friday morning, at about 2:30 o'clock, the steam whistle aroused the citizens of Evanston, and they discovered a large blaze and dense clouds of smoke arising from about the center of the business portion of the town. The fire, when first discovered, was creeping up the rear corner of a frame store building, which fronts on Fifth street, and adjoining the alley between Front and Main streets, in the rear of Beckwith, Quinn & Co.'s store. The building in which it originated was used as a sort of warehouse for storing empty boxes, etc., and was part of a wooden block of store buildings owned by Mr. J. N. Adams, which extended from the alley to Main street, and formed an "L" with two store fronts on Fifth street, and three on Main street. The flames spread rapidly, and it was greatly feared at one time that the fire would cross the street, but good work with the hose and blankets prevented that calamity. Every circumstance seems to indicate that the fire was the work of an incendiary.

Pinyon—Climax—Rebellion.

The public will remember the heated controversy in the newspapers and the courts over the title to these mines on Pinyon Hill, near Park City, and the collapse which suddenly came to the value of the stock on account of the apparent impossibility to settle the differences between the companies. The fact that they were truly local companies—that a very large share of the stock was in the hands of the people here—gave more zest to the controversy than if the mines were in the hands of foreign investors, and nearly everyone had views on the merits of the question at issue; in fact, it has been a long time since a question of that character took so great a hold of the public mind as did the Rebellion-Climax-Pinyon fight. Matters did not much improve with time; a stagnation took hold of everything surrounding the claim, the stock went down and was no more attractive. Several months have passed by, but during that time the friends of the interests were at work, and at last the ghost of litigation is buried and prosperity looms up once more. The companies owning the properties have consolidated, been united in one, to be known as the Crescent Company, and the wealth heretofore locked up in lawsuits, will be brought to light to gladden the hearts of the stockholders. In the new company the capital is divided into 600,000 shares at \$25 each, which is to be issued to holders of stock of the old companies at a certain pro rata. Active preparations are soon to commence and be vigorously prosecuted, and the large amount of ore in sight will be put to a very different use to that which it has heretofore been. The stock which recently has gone down to a mere nominal figure has already gone up as high as \$2 per share, and the beginning is hardly yet.

Mrs. Mary M. Grow, wife of Henry Grow, Esq., departed this life on Sunday evening at 6:20 o'clock, of congestive fever, at the good age of 65 years. Deceased was born in Philadelphia. We learn that a rumor has obtained credence in Salt Lake that Mr. C. C. Goodwin, the gubernatorial appointee, was occupying the position of probate judge of Cache county. The facts of the case are that on Tuesday last, Mr. Goodwin took the oath of office before a notary public. The next step will be for him to present the bonds to the treasurer, but up to the hour of going to press we have not learned that this has been done. If the treasurer of Cache county follows the precedent established by the treasurer of Salt Lake county, he will inform the applicant for the office of probate judge that one bond for the office is already on file, and that there is no vacancy in the office. A Rich Strike.

During the year 1865, while Atlanta was a young camp and every-one prospecting for the rich ledges of that section, an excitement broke out on Ross Fork creek by parties finding rich float going up into the thousands in silver. Tunnels were run in every direction and but few ledges were found, and none carrying the high-grade silver ore that they were looking for. At last it was given up. This summer Rudolph Buhren, foreman of the Buffalo mine of Atlanta, was walking and looking around to see what he could find, and all at once he tumbled upon the ledge, picked some of the ore up and took it to town and had an assay made of it, and lo! to his surprise, it went \$17,960 per ton, carrying a large percentage of gold. The new strike is situated about three miles south from the Atlanta ledge, on the right-hand fork of Ross creek, on Chlorendo Hill. He has about fifteen tons of ore now on the dump.—Vienna (Idaho) Reporter.
