THE ACCOUNT of the Conference proceedings and the returns from the registration, in this morning's HERALD, crowd out other interesting matter.

COLORADO.

Should a democratic legislature be elected in Colorado the democrats would have at least brief control of the United States Senate, for Chittenden, who succeeded by appointment Secretary Teller, only holds until the legislature meets and elects to the place. But the democrats do not expect much from Colorado. They trusted her in 1876, and she went back on them in an ungrateful manner, since which the party has felt little confidence in the Centennial state. However, there is cause for hope this year. There is a personal quarrel between Secretary Teller and Senator Hill, which has produced bitter strife in the republican ranks, the partisans of each having made the dispute their own. As the telegraph informed us at the time, Teller was victorious in the convention, as a consequence of which the two leading republican papers, both having previously espoused the cause of Hill, are not helping the ticket any. One of them is openly attacking the ticket and the men managing the campaign, and the other lends the ticket only a nominal support. A correspondent of the New York Times, writing from Denver, is not at all encouraged by the republican outlook. He says that in the Hill-Teller contest money was largely used, "and charges were boldly made on both sides, which, if true, should end the public career of all concerned." The same correspondent says the democrats are enthusiastic, united and hopeful. They have made no blunders, and have put men of unexceptionable personal character on their ticket. They have also been wise in selecting some liberal millionaires who will counteract the money influence that is so prominent on the other side. Two years ago, Garfield had a majority of 2,800 in a total vote of 53,532. Since then the voters have increased 10,000, six-tenths of which latter number the republicans claim, though the democrats do not concede the claim. The situation is problematic, nobody being able to do more than guess at the result.

THE REGISTRATION.

We have finally succeeded in obtaining very nearly complete returns from the September registration. Twenty-one of the twenty-four counties are complete, one sends the registration in one precinct and two are wholly wanting. The table published elsewhere in this issue shows a registration of 32,558. Platte county, which has a population of 2,000, returns but eighty-seven persons registered, these all being in Bullionville precinct. In view of the fact that there is large mining camp in the county, where the population is chiefly adult males, the county should return about 500 more votes than has so far been received. Emery and San Juan, the missing counties, should between them show a registration of at least 600, the former embracing the Pleasant Valley coal mines, a large section of the Denver and Rio Grande road, as well as several ranches and two or three towns. San Juan has a population of between 700 and 1,000. It may be set down as a fact that the total registration of the territory will amount to between 33,500 and 34,000. Before the registration began the HERALD made the total to be about 35,000. It based its calculation upon known facts, and figured according to recognized rules. Many of our newspaper and other friends took this paper to task for its high estimate, the apparent general belief

that being the total would be between 24,000 and 27,000. Few dared place the figure at 30,000. The HERALD's estimate was made before the order was issued excluding from the lists those persons who were in the plural marriage relation previous to the passage of the anti-polygamy law of 1862, but had not violated that law; and also those persons who had been polygamists but were not so now, and had not been for years. Had these two classes been admitted to the registration, as we thought they certainly would be, the total would have been some what above the estimate, for we counted upon the disfranchisement of 10,000 persons, male and female, whereas the Edmunds act was made to run against perhaps 12,000. The HERALD is well pleased with the large registration, notwithstanding so many people will be disappointed by the figures. It will be seen that something over 56 per cent. of the voters are males and a little over 43 per cent. females. The people have done nobly in this first duty relative to the election. We hope they will do as well on election day.
