## TELEGRAPHIC

### Washington Advice.

Washington, 9.—The ways and means committee fixed the tariff on tin per box at 105, a reduction of 2 1/2 per cent.

The cabinet considered the Hawaiian treaty.

Commodore William E. Hopkins will be retired to-morrow.

The House judiciary committee, six to six, postponed the Knott resolution declaring forfeited the lands of the Northern Pacific, and took up the bill increasing the fees of star route witnesses from the far west. This was not finally disposed of.

The comptroller decides that neither registers nor receivers are entitled to a commission of 1 per cent. on the minimum value of lands entered under the timber culture act.

The secretary of the treasury, to-day, authorized the coining of a newly designed nickel, larger and thinner than the present one.

The House commerce committee decided to have daily meetings, and prepare the river and harbor bill.

The House appropriations committee non-concurred in the amendments to the consular, military academy and Indian appropriations bills, and added \$4,000,000 to the pension bill, making it \$85,000,000.

Before the Mississippi River commission, to-day, Chas. K. Sutter declared, unreservedly, for levees as a necessary part of the improvements. Mayor Harbo concurred in the present plan.

The Senate took a vote this afternoon in reference to the Hawaiian treaty resolution, which is considered as tending to favor the abrogation of the treaty. The contest was between the finance committee, which is known to be opposed to the treaty and the foreign affairs committee, which is supposed to favor it. The finance committee was successful by vote of 31 to 20.

The tobacco convention, this afternoon, agreed to urge Congress to reduce the tax on tobacco from 12 to 8 cents per pound.

### Louis and Lorne.

San Francisco, 9.—Tucson dispatch: The royal party, Colonel Tortelotte and guard, passed here this morning, remaining hardly half an hour, though the mayor and a few citizens were at the depot to extend greetings. The royal personages failed to appear not having arisen from their slumbers.

A Star representative interviewed Colonel Tortelotte, the only person visible, upon the subject of the trouble between the Princess and Lady McDonald, as it appeared in the New York Times. He stated that there were no foundation to the allegations as he had learned from those that knew, and that the dispatch was undoubtedly originated by McDonald's friends as political capital to assist the Canadian premier to the governor generalship at the end of the Marquis's term this year. One of the attaches of the party was also seen; he expected to return to Canada this afternoon, but without any information as to the destination of the Marquis and Princess.

### The Hawaiian Treaty.

New York, 9.—The World, in a column-long editorial on the Hawaiian treaty, concludes that the Sandwich Islands treaty injures no one but benefits every one on the eastern slope of the Rocky Mountains and as a result certain sugars free of duty to the Pacific Coast, it ought to benefit consumers on the western slope. If it robs the Pacific Coast of the full benefit of free sugar, that is a thing for Californians to deal with without pestering the treaty making power in Washington. All this "fuss" over sugar is a perfectly real matter at the bottom a combination to aid the British government and Sir Charles Dilke to impede and if possible thwart negotiations now committed to ex-President Grant, of a reciprocal commerce alliance with Mexico, which is a country capable of producing an indefinite supply of sugar. If this negotiation is successful the principle of unhindered trade will in the end sweep into alliance not only all states of Central America but Cuba and Porto Rico also.

### The Railroads.

Chicago, 9.—A meeting of the directors of the Chicago and Western Indiana Rail road will be held in New York on Friday, President Harris not being able to attend the meeting here.

The earnings of the Chicago and Grand Trunk Railroad the past six months, increased \$418,000 over the same period last year. That road now controls all the avenues to Canada from the United States.

New York, 9.—A dividend of 3 1/2 per cent. was declared yesterday on the first preferred stock of the St. Louis and San Francisco Railroad.

Kiernan's News says: None of the bondholders of the Oregon companies have availed themselves of the option to take the new 20,000 shares of stock, nor will the stockholders, as they can buy it so much cheaper on the market.

### Murder and Suicide.

Lynchburg, Va., 9.—At a ball in Bedford county, on Saturday night, a young lady, Adelle Reed, said to Scott Clayton, who was calling the figures, that he was not calling correctly; he made some sharp response which was resented by one of Miss Reed's admirers, Amos Barksdale; the latter called Clayton out, hot words ensued, Barksdale drew a knife, sprang on Clayton and inflicted a horrible gash from the right eye to the back of the neck, severing the jugular and causing immediate death. The scene in the ball room was sickening; women in fancy ball dresses fainting and falling into pools of blood and a regular melee followed between the partisans of the two men. Barksdale escaped unobserved, wandered to another part of the county, borrowed a gun of an acquaintance, and completed the tragedy by shooting himself through the bowels.

### Business Failures.

New York, 9.—The Tribune says: L. Wolfe & Co. wholesale dealers in millinery and fancy goods here, is the same firm as Theo. Welch & Co., of Tucson, A. T., whose failure was announced by telegraph yesterday. Goods were purchased in this city and payments made here in the name of L. Wolfe & Co. The goods were shipped to Tucson, where the store was situated. Late reports give the liabilities at \$75,000.

### British Bits.

London, 9.—Gladstone will probably go to the south of Europe shortly, but there is no cause of anxiety regarding his condition.

It is authoritatively denied that the visit of Dr. Schroder, of Berlin, to London, is in consequence of his having been summoned to attend professionally the Prince of Wales.

Joseph Cowan, M. P., in addressing his constituents at Newcastle, said the government would be compelled to annex Egypt, which would lead to the breaking up of the Turkish Empire, and to the commencement and formation of a British Northern African Empire.

### Cable Cables.

St. Petersburg, 9.—Telegrams from Vladivostok report a movement by China against Corea as possible.

Rome, 9.—An autograph letter from Emperor William, of Germany, to the Pope, is received at the Vatican.

### Miscellaneous.

Columbus, Ohio, 9.—The Supreme Court overruled the motion of James E. Campbell for a writ of mandamus to count the vote in the Seventh Congressional district, for H. L. Morey and Henry Morey, for different persons, so that Morey holds the certificate.
