XLVII. CONGRESS. SECOND SESSION. SENATE. Washington, 17.-Vest moved that a committee of five senators investigate the whole subject of the Yellowstone Park leases...

HOUSE. Washington, 17.-The elections committee reported in favor of Sessinghaus against Frost in the Missouri contested case.

The House resumed the tariff bill in committee of the whole. Bayard's amendment reducing the duty on sugars of 13 to 16 Dutch standard from 3 to 2 1/2 cents a pound...

In committee of the whole, Dunning announced that the republicans would abandon the tariff bill, and severely censured his party for deluding the people.

Kassen blamed the democrats for delaying the bill. Haskell moved that the committee rise, and that all debate on succeeding schedules of the bill close in an hour.

Carlisle raised the point that the motion was not in order. A discussion on the point is now vigorously proceeding, Haskell, Hammond, Randall and Carlisle being chief speakers...

Dr. Glenn Murdered. San Francisco, 17.-A dispatch from Princeton, Colusa County, says: Dr. H. J. Glenn, the largest wheat raiser of the state...

Opposed to the Treaty. Denver, 12.-General Edward M. McCook, ex-governor of Colorado, telegraphs Representative W. D. Kelly, Washington, to-night: If the Mexican reciprocity treaty is consummated, the result will be practically free trade.

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Chicago, 17.-Fox River Iron Company, Green Bay, Wis., has assigned to J. T. Booth, of Milwaukee. The company had a capital of \$300,000.

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THE FLOODS.

Cleveland, 17.-Thirty thousand dollars were raised to-day for Cincinnati. Louisville, 17.-The river is forty-four feet six inches, and stationary. It is raining hard to-night.

The river is receding. It is now 44 feet 3 inches. No casualties. The worst is over. It is cold and trying to snow.

Toledo, 17.-There is much suffering from the flood along the Upper Maumee. Many homes are abandoned. The ice abreast of the city gave way this morning and flooded Union Depot and Water street.

Chicago, 17.-The relief fund of the board of trade and produce exchanges has reached \$2,700. Some has been forwarded to river points.

St. Louis, 17.-The river has risen nearly a foot since noon. Cincinnati, 17.-The water at 10 o'clock was 63 feet, 5 1/2 inches. Raining all night; colder now.

At the Marietta, the river rose all night and is rising now two inches per hour.

Theatrical News. New York, 17.-The chief theatrical events next week will be Salvini's farewell performance at the Academy of Music...

It is announced that Irving makes his first appearance as Matthias, in "The Bells," at the Manhattan (Late Germania) under Wallack's management.

Mary Anderson has signed a contract to act at the London Lyceum, next winter, under Abbey. Charles Wyndham reappears at the Madison Square in April.

Charles Overton goes to San Francisco with the Harrisons to play "Photos." McCullough appears here next April.

"Siberia" will be produced at Haverly's Fourteenth Street on the 20th instant. Mrs. Catherine Sinclair publishes a card denying that she was present at the sale of Edwin Forest's effects.

Did Not Suicide. Kansas City, 17.-Reports from Independence received to-night indicate the supposition of suicide in connection with the death of Mrs. H. M. Valle is unfounded.

New York, 17.-Alonso Follett, a Wall street broker, who failed lately, had liabilities of \$3,353,000; nominal assets, \$2,167,263; actual assets, \$1,690,355.

Muscogee, 17.-Spieche, the rebel chief, has fled and many of his men have become constitutionalists. The party trouble is not believed to be over yet.

Gallen, O., 17.-Following were the casualties by to-day's accident: H. G. Guthrie, Madison Square Theatre, New York, instantly killed; D. I. Faust, Shelby, Ohio, so badly injured that he died soon after being taken to Gallen; R. Cadell, draughtsman in the general roadmaster's office, Cleveland, injured and died soon after reaching Gallen. Nine were injured more or less.

Wagner. Venice, 13.-Wagner's remains were placed on board a train, and accompanied by his family, left for Bayreuth. Mair, director of the musical college, members of the Artists' Clubs and other persons followed the remains to the station.

Wouldn't Indict. San Francisco, 17.-Eureka, Nevada, dispatch: The grand jury unanimously refused to find an indictment against George K. Reek, for killing James E. Anderson.

The Michigan Senatorship. Lansing, 17.-One ballot: Ferry 11, Newton 45, 61 scattering.

Mexican Treaty. New York, 17.-Speaking of the new Mexican treaty the Times remarks: We don't think it necessary to decry this treaty because a brisk trade with Mexico will help Jay Gould's southwestern railroads.

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The Irish.

Cork, 17.-Sentences were passed against Jno. O'Brien and ex-suspect Hodnett, to two months' imprisonment, and against ex-suspect Gilhooly, to three months' imprisonment, for using intimidating language against government officers.

Dublin, 17.-All the prisoners were placed in the dock except Patrick and Delany. The sensation had scarcely subsided before Jas. Carey stepped into the witness box. The surprise among the prisoners was unbounded.

St. Peterburg, 17.-The settlement between the government of Russia and the Vatican is completed. Bishop Popil will take the See of Warsaw.

Paris, 17.-The returns of the value of French imports for January show an increase of 25,525,000 francs compared with January, 1882, the increase of the value of exports for the same period, was 6,400,000 francs.

Berlin, 17.-The Philharmonic society presented many of Wagner's pieces. A bust of Wagner crowned with laurels, was placed in the orchestra.

Washington, 17.-The Star furnishes the correspondence between Haskell and Townsend. The latter wrote Haskell that on advice he had decided not to prosecute the dispute until Haskell had read a stenographic report of Townsend's remarks, and seen if he hadn't misinterpreted them.

Morrison, who has acted as Townsend's friend, says the correspondence has now closed and the matter may rest.

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
