Miscellaneous

Ottawa, 28.—It is understood that the government has consented to subsidize the direct steamship line with Mexico. Fifty thousand dollars will be placed in the estimate.

Chicago, 28.—The eldest daughter of Judge Gary, chief justice of the supreme court, has taken the veil.

Arrangements are completed for a match between Carver and Bogardus at the Chicago Driving Park, next Saturday, one hundred birds each, five ground traps, London gun club rules, eighty yard boundary.

New York, 28.—Trang's snuff mills, at Dutch Kills and Morphet, Long Island, were seized and destroyed by revenue officers.

Troy, N. Y., 28.—Thomas Hayes, of this city, has begun a suit to recover 4,400 acres of land in Texas granted his father, the sheriff of Atascosa County, in 1835.

Pittsburg, 28.—The Western Nail Association has decided to close the factories two week more, commencing on next Monday.

Albany, 28.—The assembly congressional apportionment committee referred to a sub committee the New York City districts with a view, it is said, of giving one district to republicans.

Philadelphia, 28.—The mint coinage for February was \$2,651,440 pieces valued at \$1,000,360.

The citizens' committee, while favoring the retention of League Island by the government, say its abandonment will not be detrimental to the city, as the 617 acres are fairly worth \$1,250,000.

New York, 28.—Lewis P. Carman, ex-secretary of the Manhattan Fire Insurance Company, has been missing since Sunday. His accounts with the company are short about \$40,000.

East Saginaw, Mich., 28.—The republican state convention nominated Austin Blair for justice of the supreme court for the long term, and Thomas J. O'Brien for the short term.

Louisville, 28.—The cotton exposition building will cover fifteen acres. Laying the foundations will begin to-morrow. It will be completed in July. Botanical and art annexes will be added. It is probable the National Agricultural Exposition will be held here at the same time.

Youngstown, Ohio, 28.—It is understood that the receiver of Brown, Bonnell & Co., will start the works again on Monday.

Philadelphia, 28.—The receivers of the Philadelphia and Reading Railroad and Coal and Iron Company, to-day, formally surrendered to officers of the companies, control of the property of those corporations.

Providence, 28.—The republican state convention is called for March 10th.

Atlanta, Ga., 28.—The Pacific Railway is completed to Anniston, Alabama.

Windsor Lock, Conn., 28.—The loss by the burning of the wool scouring mills of Dwight S. Tanner & Co., \$40,000. Insured.

The Floods.

Shawnee, Ill., 28.—The worst is over here. In town an awful scene of desolation is visible. Great gaps are left by the houses swept away.

In one portion four solid blocks of dwellings entirely disappeared. The Presbyterian church floated away half a mile. Several mills and business houses are entirely gone.

The principal merchant in Blackburn, Ky., has a stock of 2,000, dry goods, on a barge tied to a tree. The villages of Blackburn and Raleigh, Ky., both have been nearly wiped out.

Over 100 houses in these places are gone. At Columbus, Ky., over ten feet of water is spread over the town and fills nearly all the stores.

The Newhall Disaster.

Milwaukee, 28.—The grand jury investigating the Newhall House catastrophe came in with a final presentment to-day, finding a lengthy report, synopsized as follows:

The fire was incendiary; all lives were lost within thirty minutes after the discovery; the hotel was constructed as any at the time of its erection; John F. Antisdel did not employ sufficient help, and was careless in not guarding the hotel more carefully, after so many attempts had been made to burn the house; of all employes only Engineer William Linehan exerted himself properly to save life; Coroner Kuepper was brutal, harsh and indecent.

Cable Cuts.

Trieste, 28.—Four persons arrested in August for sending bombs from Venice were released and the Austrian Government so informed.

London, 28.—The Duke of Cambridge presiding at a meeting of the National Rifle Association looked forward with pleasure to giving the American team a most hearty welcome at Wimbledon.

Eleven thousand three hundred bales of Port Phillips Sydney and Adelaide wool sold to-day. The market was fairly animated.

Rome, 28.—Three emigrants from Trieste and six others were arrested for being implicated in throwing bombs yesterday. It is believed the gang will be arrested.

Ending a Legislative Career.

The Tariff Bill.

Washington, 28.—The best opinion obtainable to-night is almost unanimous that the tariff revision is dead for this session. Ex-Speaker Randall is the only prominent man on either side of the House who does not privately admit this.

Randall thinks the bill can yet be passed. The delay in getting the conference committee together, when every moment is of such value, and the fact that the conferees from both houses are instructed on points which must be settled before the main subject is reached, militate against the chances of the bill.

The House yesterday, instructed its conferees to consider the constitutional objections to the origination of tariff measures by the Senate, and the latter body, to-day, instructed its conferees if they became advised, that the House conferees were acting under any limitation, to retire from the conference.

With these instructions the committee meet to-night, and all speculation as to the tariff waits upon the first report of progress from them.

Interchangeable Citizenship.

Washington, 28.—Edmunds this morning reported adversely to the Senate, from the committee on judiciary, the House bill to provide for the restoration of citizenship to such citizens of the United States as have become naturalized as subjects of Great Britain, and desire to return to their original allegiance.

This bill was intended to give the force of law to the third article of the convention between the United States and Great Britain, which was concluded on May 30, '70, which provides that if any citizen of the United States naturalized within the dominion of Her Britannic Majesty shall renew his residence in the United States, the government may, on his own application and on such conditions as that government may impose, readmit him to the character and privileges of a citizen of the United States, and Great Britain shall not in that case claim him as a British subject on account of his former naturalization.

The Robbers Sentenced.

San Francisco, 28.—Elko dispatch: Nav, the wounded train robber, was brought here from Salt Lake yesterday. This morning the robbers were brought into court. All pleaded guilty to assault to rob and asked to be sentenced immediately.

Nay, Hawley and Frances were sentenced to fourteen years, and Earl and Jackson to twelve years in the penitentiary.
