Crime.

Montreal, 1.—Three bodies were stolen last night St. Scholastique dead house.
Springfield, Mass., 1.—John Goodwin, absconding Chicopee contractor, owes from \$75,000 to \$100,000.
New York, 1.—Harry Hill says Jere Dunn, who killed Elliott, once shot a man in Mulberry street, and that the enmity between Dunn and Elliott grew out of Dunn's friendship for Crownin, a variety actor, whom Elliott disliked.
Fargo, 2.—Peter Dakestrom, a farmer living twelve miles from town, attempted to kill his wife with a sledge. Leaving her for dead he went and hanged himself. His wife will recover. Dakestrom was the richest farmer in the vicinity. No cause is known.
Omaha, 1.—Perry Shotwell, who shot Henry Eberling on the night of the killing, was convicted of manslaughter.
Des Moines, 1.—In the case of W. A. Kilne, of Corning, held for the murder of Mayor Stubbs, of Folk City, on *habeas corpus*, an alibi was proved.
Parkerburg, W. Va., 2.—Joseph Paul, on trial for killing Lewis Marquis, was found guilty of murder in the first degree.
Columbus, Ohio, 2.—The jury in the case of J. D. Watson, lobbyist, charged with an attempt to bribe Representative Bloch, of Cleveland, last winter, this morning returned a verdict of guilty. The penalty is from three to ten years in the penitentiary. Sentence was reserved.

Tabor Re-Married.

Washington, 1.—Senator Tabor, of Colorado, was married to-night to Mrs. Elizabeth B. McCourt, of Oaksho, Wis., by Father Chapelle, pastor of St. Matthews Church. Senator-elect Bowen, Secretary and Mrs. Teller, Senator and Mrs. Hill, Representative and Mrs. Belford, Senator Sawyer, ex-Senator Chaffee, General Charles Adams, ex-Minister to Bolivia and Hon. Otto and Mrs. William N. Bash, were among the guests. Mr. and Mrs. Tabor will remain in Washington till the close of the session. They will then go to New York for a brief visit, and thence go to Colorado. The marriage took place in a private parlor at Willard's Hotel, which was magnificently decorated for the occasion, and an elegant supper was spread in an adjoining room. The presents were numerous and of great value. One of the senator's presents to his bride was a diamond necklace valued at \$75,000.

Obituary.

New York, 2.—Miss Margaret Emmett, daughter of Thomas Addes Emmett and niece of the Irish patriot, died, aged 90 years, yesterday morning at No. 10 West Hundred and seventh street.
D. A. Williamson, a retired merchant died yesterday at his home, No. 299 seventh avenue. He was 63 years old, Williamson, already a sufferer from ill health, went to California to recuperate. He remained three years, after which he returned to this city, and lived quietly with his family, consisting of his wife, son, and two daughters. It has just been discovered that the man who was found dead in his bed in a hotel at Ostend, Belgium in July, '81, was E. V. Sutter, son of the discoverer of gold in California, Gen. John A. Sutter.

The Sun Gazers.

New York, 2.—The scientific expedition going to Caroline Island, in the South Pacific, to observe the eclipse of the sun, consists of E. S. Holden, of Madison, Wisconsin; Dr. C. S. Hastings, of Baltimore, Maryland; C. W. Rockwell, of Terrytown; E. D. Preston, Winslow Upton and Lieutenant Brown. They sailed to-day on the *Acapulco*. Two gentlemen from the Royal Society, of England, will join the party at Panama.

Fire Escape.

New York, 2.—A large crowd collected on Broadway, attracted by the working of the fire escape at the Sturdevant House. Several men came down, and two chambermaids swung themselves from upper windows, and descended as gracefully as any fairy in a pantomime. It was suggested to the Sturdevant by the Newhall House fire in Milwaukee.
