FOREIGN.

Madrid, 3.—The authorities continue to act vigorously in Andalusia. The president, secretary and twelve members of another branch of the secret society were arrested at Pedroso, and letters and statutes have been seized. Twelve members of another branch were arrested at Cazalla de la Sierra.

Geneva, 3.—The Tribune says: The British foreign secretary has instructed the minister at Berne to insist upon the annulment of the decree expelling the leaders of the salvation army from Switzerland.

Vienna, 3.—Four hundred more workmen were dismissed from the manufactory of firearms at Stoker on account of lack of orders from abroad. The total number of employees is reduced from 6,000 to 5,000. Many intend to emigrate to America.

Another Will Huddle.

Newport, R. I., 3.—Anna G. Fell, executor of the will of the late Alexander G. Mercer, D. D., has begun an equity suit in the supreme court requesting a decision as to who is meant by the managers and directors of the Pennsylvania Hospital, Philadelphia, President of Harvard University, President of Yale College, and secretary of the Smithsonian Institutions, to each of which large sums are bequeathed. Mercer passed as a poor man and was assessed at \$10,000. His estate was worth over \$1,000,000.

A Law.

Washington, 4.—At 2:35 a. m. the tax and tariff bill was received from the House. The president of the Senate immediately signed it, and a few minutes later President Arthur affixed his signature. The bill is now, therefore, a law.

Philadelphia, 3.—Major King and Police Sergeant Albright are summoned on a suit for damages by Michael Cleary, pugilist, for preventing sparring exhibition by McCleary and Sullivan.

Crime.

Boston, 3.—Chas. F. Boyle, agent of B. D. Brown & Co., Burlington, Iowa, jeweler, was arrested for embezzling \$1,000 for his employers.

Fire.

Lynchburg, Va., 3.—Two incendiary fires occurred to-day. One at the Piedmont House. The impression is the fire was started to forward the establishment of a paid fire department.

Stephens Dying.

Atlanta, midnight, 3.—Stephens is dying. The doctors says he can not live three hours.

The Boukofsky Case.

On Saturday morning, N. Boukofsky was arrested on a charge of brutally assaulting his son. On Friday afternoon, the boy Edward Boukofsky was found in a sad condition and taken into the residence of Mr. Howard Sebree. It was reported that the boy's father had hanged him by the neck until he was nearly dead. The boy testified that his father had tied him with a strap, but not about the neck; and that he had beaten him with the other end, in which there was a knot, because he was muddled. He said his father hit him over the eye. The boy was carried into Mr. Sebree's in a sorry condition. It was charged that the boy was drunk, and had taken about the fourth of a quart of port wine. Dr. Williamson was called to attend the little fellow, and gave his testimony substantially as follows: I was called to the residence of Mr. Sebree by telephone about 5.30 p.m. on Friday; the boy lay insensible on the floor; I examined him to ascertain whether there was any pulsation or respiration. Mrs. Sebree remarked that she had bathed him with water over the face and head. The doctor said that was proper. Witness stated that the report had been made to him that the boy had been hanged. "I could feel the flutterings of his heart, but he had no pulsation. His mouth was bloated out and full of froth, his face was black. He finally commenced breathing, and I said he would get well. After the lapse of fifteen minutes he was carried home, and he soon recovered and talked. Three minutes more in that condition would have killed him. It was the worst thing I ever saw. When I was there it was reported that other scenes had occurred equally as violent. The pupils of his eyes were expanded and dilated, which was caused by congestion of the brain produced by strangulation, his breathing being cut off. Defendant came to my house in the middle of the night, and I told him to go home. Regarding the allegation that the boy had been drinking, Dr. Williamson stated that he discovered no signs of drink upon the boy when he attended him. Several witnesses were examined and the case was finally dismissed and Mr. Boukofsky discharged.

Spanish Treatment of the North American Indians.

From the beginning the Spaniards came as cruel and merciless masters; the Franciscans, with few exceptions, as kindly and genial companions. The Spaniards were, to be sure, more liberal in the use of Scripture than any Puritan, but they were also much more formidable in the application of it. They maintained unequivocally that the earth belonged to the elect. The famous "Requisition," which was to be read by the Spanish commanders on entering each province for conquest, gave the full Bible narrative of the origin of the human race, announced the lordship of St. Peter, the gift of the New World to Spain by his successor the Pope; and deducted from all this the right to compel the natives to adopt the true religion. If they refused they might rightfully be enslaved or killed. The learned Dr. Pedro Santandrea, addressing the king in 1657 in regard to De Soto's expedition, wrote thus:

"This is the land promised by the Eternal Father to the faithful, since we are commanded by God in the Holy Scriptures to take it from them, being idolaters, and by reason of their idolatry and sin to put them all to the knife, leaving no living thing save maidens and children, their cities robbed and sacked, their walls and houses levelled to the earth."

In another part of the same address the author describes Florida as "now in possession of the Demon," and the natives as "lost sheep which have been snatched away by the dragon, the Demon." There is no doubt that a genuine superstition entered into the gloomy fanaticism of the Spaniards. When Columbus brought back from one of his voyages some native chiefs whose garments and ornaments were embroidered with cats and owls, the curate Bernales announced without hesitation that these grotesque forms represented the deities they worshipped. It is astonishing how much easier it is to justify one's self in taking away a man's property or his life when one is thoroughly convinced that he worships the devil. At any rate, the Spaniards acted upon this principle. Twelve years after the first discovery of Hispaniola, as Columbus himself writes, six-sevenths of the natives were dead through ill-treatment.—Harper's Magazine.
