### WASHINGTON.

Washington, 7.—Upon the arrest of seven Americans at Panama, on suspicion of having been engaged in robbery from the Panama Railroad, of \$500,000 sent to pay the officers and men of the U. S. S. *Lackawanna*, the U. S. vice consul, P. W. Turpin, at once applied to the Columbian authorities demanding a hearing for the accused. The action he reported to the state department and his course was approved and instructions given him to use every effort to secure for imprisoned Americans a speedy hearing. Meanwhile the Panama Railroad officials who had employed American detectives were enabled to throw obstacles in the way upon a plea that the ends of justice would be thwarted if time were not given to obtain evidence, and representations were made to the state department that the men were undoubtedly guilty. The department, however, in a correspondence which ensued with our counsel, instructed him to exhaust every means to obtain for them a speedy hearing and an impartial trial on the 23rd ult. Turpin informed the department he had employed legal assistance and hoped soon to overcome the delays which appeared to be incidental to the criminal practice of that country. Secretary Frelinghuysen stated to-day the matter had been vigorously pushed and is now receiving the close attention of the department; that consul's employment of legal assistance has been approved and instruction to that effect had been sent to him.

Indians resident here held a meeting at their rooms to-night and appointed a committee to arrange for serenade and reception to Greham, on his arrival.

I have read, in your paper, the very strange steps taken by J. G. Bigelow and his efforts to get at my money, which the good, kind and generous people gave to me for the benefit of myself and my dear little baby. I have never employed Bigelow to attend to any business for me, and he has never rendered me any service either, and I want the public to know this. He pretends to have done so much for my husband, but I never employed him, and I have no money for Bigelow, and I hope the court will throw aside his unjust claim. #### Josephite Conference.

Kirtland, O., 7.—On the second day of the conference of the Latter-day Saints, a permanent organization was effected at the afternoon session. President, Joseph Smith, Jr.; vice-president, R. M. Elvan; secretary, Herman Smith. The committee on credentials reported delegates present from the following districts: Pittsburgh, northern Illinois, Iowa, Little Sioux District, southeastern Illinois; Michigan, northern Indiana, Deatur District, Ills.; Kewanee District, Mass.; Florida, Missouri, St. Louis District, London, Canada, northern Nebraska, western Iowa, Pottawatomie District, Iowa; Tremont District, western Missouri; Illinois, Nauvoo District, northern Illinois, Chicago branch of the church, Idaho, Nevada, central Texas, Kansas and Georgia. Councillor W. W. Blair, reported a programme of working in the far west. He said in Nevada district there were a large number of Utah Mormons and out few Latter-day Saints; in Idaho he said there were 10,000 Mormons, and several small branches of the reorganized church. The financial condition of these branches was excellent and the mission itself sustaining. Reports from elders of the quorum of the twelve apostles of the church, gave the condition of affairs of the church in various localities east and west. Elders Joseph Love and H. N. Hanson, of Utah, made reports of the progress of work in the territory. These missionaries have been working in the heart of the polygamist's camp, converting many to the Latter-day faith. The afternoon services were closed by the president reading a lengthy memorial presented by Secretary Frelinghuysen some months ago asking that a distinction be made by government between Utah Mormons and the reorganized church. Tomorrow the services will consist of preaching only by Joseph Smith Elder W. W. Blair, Elder Garley and others.

### FRIGHTFUL ACCIDENT.

Fifteen Persons Killed by a Falling Building.

Greenville, Texas, 7.—About 2 o'clock this morning the end of a three story brick hotel fell, burying the inmates between its walls. Some fifteen persons are known to have been killed; the others escaped unhurt. The ruins took fire and many bodies were roasted in the flames. Greenville has no fire engine. A dispatch was sent to the Sherman fire department for relief; a fire engine arrived by special train and prevented the spread of the flames. Up to 1.30 this afternoon five bodies have been taken from the ruins, but were charred beyond recognition. Following is the list as the killed as far as known: R. R. Neal, Mrs. M. E. Print, Proprietor Geo. D. Print, F. D. N. Riley, J. E. Ford, Frank West, Lou. Davis, Louis Chancy, and five negroes. The building was erected within the past year, and has been for some time considered unsafe, the walls being very light.

Another account says thirteen persons were killed. Added to the list of dead are Louis Albert, jeweller, and a man named Hill. Fifteen occupants escaped. J. D. Turner was terribly mangled; he may die. The piteous wails of the imprisoned and burning victims, to whom no helping hand could render assistance, were heartrending. A number of business firms adjoining, were burned out. The remains that have been taken from the ruins, so far, are simply chunks of burnt flesh, unrecognizable. Business houses all closed.

#### An Interesting Item.

Chicago, 1.—The Chicago, Burlington and Quincy Railroad has issued a circular to shippers stating that it is prepared to accept freight through without change to Salt Lake City, and points in central Utah, via its own line of the Burlington and Missouri River and Denver and Rio Grande. It is understood that this means a sharp competition for the Union Pacific trade in that territory.

#### The Servant-Girl in Social Life.

Shortly after the flood, as we are informed, Abram's wife turned her domestic, Hagar, out of the house on account of her arrogant conduct, which is perhaps the first authenticated instance on record of trouble between mistress and servant-girl. This sort of trouble which began so early, still survives in forms so various and often so exasperating as to raise the impatient question whether the serving class is the only dark part of creation which improvement has failed to reach. The question is, no doubt, full of aggravation and discouragement, yet there has been improvement, but it has been of slow attainment, forming no exception to the great law of progressive social amelioration.

Social changes, it is to be remembered, especially of the alleviating and elevating kind, are always slow. We are beginning to talk about social evolution, and the new science of sociology which treats of it; but we have to take ages into account before we can realize any positive conception of advance. Much of the barbarism of early society clings tenaciously to the domestic relations, while the modification of human nature and the corresponding mitigation of social imperfections go on but very gradually, tardily, and partially.

Still further reason for the slowness of improvement in the present case arises from the peculiarity of the relations involved. In times of early violence, it is the weak that are subjugated and enslaved, and, as civilization advances, it is ever the lowest and most ignorant class of any society that falls into the condition of mental servitude. The feeblest, the least competent, the least provident, naturally sink to the bottom of the social scale, and become the helpers, the dependents, the drudges, and the servile appendages of the classes who have wealth, intelligence and power. In domestic life these relations become organized with the subject class at the base of the social structure. Improving agencies will obviously not take effect alike upon the higher and lower elements. Many causes will operate powerfully to maintain separate interests, to favor the superior class, and to hinder their inferiors, so that servants will be the last to be reached by elevating societies.—*Popular Science Monthly.*
