Suicide.

Washington, 12.—A young man named Jas. Torpey, suicided this evening by jumping from the Washington and Alexandria ferry boat. He left a letter saying that his act was prompted by physical and financial misfortune, and asking that his father, whose address he gave at 87 Jesse street, San Francisco, be informed of his death.

The Fisheries Exhibition.

London, 12.—The international fisheries exhibition was to-day opened with great eclat by the Prince of Wales. The ceremonies on the occasion were in accordance with the programme heretofore announced. The Prince of Wales expressed regret at the unavoidable absence of the Queen and conveyed the thanks of her majesty to all countries participating in the display and to the representatives for their untiring exertions in the work of insuring the success of the exhibition.

Light Coin.

Washington, 12.—At the annual assay of coins of the United States held by the assay commissioners in February last, it was found that some of the gold coins issued from the New Orleans mint in January, 1882, contained but 895.93 of gold, being .007 of 1,000 below the limit and is a greater deviation from the legal standard than is allowed by law. Snowden, superintendent of the Philadelphia mint, was detailed to go to New Orleans to investigate the matter. His report, which has just been submitted to the secretary of the treasury, places the responsibility for the deficiency upon the superintendent of the New Orleans mint.

Railroad Racket.

Boston, 12.—A telegram from President Nickerson, of the Mexican Central Railway, explains that the report of a stoppage of cash subsidies by the Mexican government is untrue, and he explicitly denies it. It is stated here on good authority that a serious construction fight is imminent between the Missouri Pacific and Atchison, Topeka and Santa Fe roads. The Boston people think the Missouri Pacific is furnishing money for the construction of the St. Louis, Fort Scott and Wichita Railroad, now pushing into the Atchison's territory toward Wichita. The Atchison will reply by paralleling the Missouri Pacific's main line to St. Louis and using its Pleasant Hill branch, now extended east, to Kansas City.

New York, 12.—Governments irregular, but in main 1 1/2 per cent higher. Stocks showed decided manifestation to manipulation by professional speculators this forenoon. It opened generally a fraction lower than closing prices last night, and continued quiet up to about 11. During that hour there were good many purchases of broken lots of stock (below 100 shares) at prices a fraction above the general market. This is generally regarded as an indication of buying by small inside speculators and reflects improvement in confidence outside; but about 11 there was an increase in selling orders for larger amounts, which seemed to be a concerted attack, and under which there was a sharp break of 1 1/2 to 1 3/4 per cent on the general list within an hour. After the announcement of the bank statement which was unusually favorable, market became steady and a small fraction of the decline was recovered at 12.30 o'clock. After 12.30 market was weak, declined 3/4 to 1 1/2; Nashville to 48 1/2, but just before 2 there was a partial recovery of 3/4 to 1/2.

Want the Duty Restored.

Pittsburg, 12.—A movement has been inaugurated by the tin plate companies of this city and Philadelphia, for a restoration of the protective tariff on tin plate. It is claimed that the reduction lately made by Congress has virtually ruined the industry of this country and unless they have two and a half cent rates those in business will be compelled to close down their mills. A petition is now being extensively circulated and numerously signed calling the attention of Congress to the fact asking that the duty be restored.

Nevada Mining Stocks.

San Francisco, 12.—The Post's weekly review of mining transactions says the fluctuations of the Comstock market during the past week were not so violent as during the week preceding, nor was the volume of business so large. The bad break in the price of Chollar, of middle stocks, Yellow Jacket, of the Gold Hill group, and a hot bear movement against the principal north end stocks, demoralized dealers for a time and caused a general though not serious lowering of values. Toward the close, however, and especially to-day the market took an up-grade once more and several of the stocks are even higher as we write than they were at the corresponding time last Saturday, and the whole market is looking and acting well. It is moving and shifting about upon new prospects which have been found in such mines as Sierra Nevada, Union, Hale & Norcross, Chollar and Yellow Jacket, and as those prospects continue bright and are increasing in importance, it is but reasonable to assume that prices will soon be higher.

Cable Clicks.

Berlin, 12.—The North German Gazette ascribes the rejection of the bill to increase the duty on wool by the Reichstag to hostile rates of the Polish deputies, whose efforts it says are wholly directed toward the restoration of the kingdom of Poland, and who favor every measure detrimental to the empire.

The hygienic exhibition was formally opened to-day by Crown Prince Frederick.

Rome, 12.—The Moniteur has reason to believe an important and very categorical document has just been sent by the Vatican to Irish bishops.

Paris, 12.—It is stated that Waddington has a political mission to Berlin where he is now stopping en route to Moscow.

La France says Brun, minister of marine, has a dispatch from De Brazza, stating that he has taken possession of the village of Leunge and the adjacent territory in the name of the French government.

Constantinople, 12.—General Wallace, United States minister has sent a note to the Porte demanding that until the negotiations now pending have come to a conclusion, the regulations of petroleum deposits existing previous to the recent order be continued.

The Fair Divorce.

Virginia, Nev., 12.—The divorce suit of Theresa Fair vs. G. Fair came up at the district court this morning. B. S. Messick appeared for the plaintiff, and N. N. Stone, of San Francisco, for the defendant. Stone submitted a general demurrer to the complaint, on the ground that it did not state facts sufficient to constitute a cause of action. The demurrer was submitted without argument, and was at once overruled by the court. Stone then said the defence would file an answer to the complaint. Messick asked that the court appoint a time to-day to hear the proofs; also that the examination be conducted privately. The court appointed 12 o'clock for the purpose specified. At 12 o'clock the court met, but reporters were excluded. In less than an hour the attorneys came out, and it was soon known that a decree of divorce had been granted as had been asked for, and that plaintiff had been allowed \$4,250,000 in money and United States bonds and the family residence in San Francisco; also the custody of the minor children, Virginia, Theresa Alice and Charles. The custody of the eldest boy, James G. Fair, was awarded to defendant.

Senator Fair arrived this morning from San Francisco on business connected with the sale of the Brunswick will and the pending transfer of the Yellow Jacket Mine to the Sharon party. The transfer of the entire business will take place about the end of the present month.

The Sunday Closing Law.

Wilkesbarre, Pa., 12.—The Sunday law was being enforced against liquor dealers. The protective association wants the co-operation of the mayor in stopping the sale of milk and closing barber shops, cigar shops, livery stables, etc. The mayor declines the invitation.

Jersey City, 12.—The police authorities have notified liquor dealers that the Sunday law will be enforced tomorrow. Sunday has heretofore been the most profitable day of the week.
