A Cute Communication.

Washington, 22.—The Post will publish to-morrow a letter from Secretary Chandler to ex-Congressman Dusenbury, of Virginia, in reply to a communication received from the latter, calling attention to the levying of assessments for political purposes on employees of the Norfolk navy yard. The Secretary, after answering the charges concerning the alleged violation of law says: Your letters, which you have made public, indicate that you take a very strong interest in the reformation of the navy yard at Norfolk, and your long familiarity with the yard, as a constant candidate for Congress since the 7th, seeking special support from the votes there employed, will undoubtedly enable you to make many more valuable suggestions for the suppression of abuses therein, which will gladly be received and considered. That you should now, for the first time, call the attention of the department and public to such abuses after you have ceased to expect any personal benefit from the management of the yard, is a most commendable performance of public duty by a private citizen.

Suspicious.

St. Louis, 22.—Ex-Judge C. H. Krum, one of the best known lawyers in St. Louis, a prominent republican and appointed United States attorney by Grant, and subsequently counsel for defendants in the celebrated whisky trials, has been absent since April 26. His father reported him under treatment by Dr. Hammond, of New York, but a telegram from New York states that Hammond had no knowledge of Krum. His father to-day refused to answer inquiries. A few days ago the probate court issued a citation in the estate of Charles W. Ford, of which Krum is the administrator. He has failed to make a report to the court since July, 1882. He has also failed to report in the estate of David W. Bell, of which he is also administrator. Under these circumstances Mr. Krum's disappearance, if it may be so called, causes much comment.

A Wrecked Steamer Identified.

Chicago, 22.—Pieces of wreckage identified as belonging to the schooner Wells Burt, came ashore north of the city limits to-day, and leave no doubt that she was wrecked in the storm on Sunday night, as she was due here about that time from Buffalo. Her owner, J. S. Dunham, of this city, has no doubt that the upper rigging of the sunken schooner, visible above the waves off Grassy Point, about twenty miles north of this city, are those of the Burt, and that her crew of eleven souls all perished.

Convicted.

New York, 22.—Jas. H. Marriett, arrested on a charge of absconding from Paris with \$75,000 worth of diamonds entrusted to him by a jeweler named Kramer, to show William Waldorf, an actor, was convicted on the charge of grand larceny with a recommendation to mercy. Marco Pescux, who accompanied Marriett and to whom he has been married since the arrest, manifested deep grief when the verdict was announced. The case will be appealed.

A Farce.

New York, 22.—Giase Bettini, a young Italian lieutenant, who recently shot himself on account of a love affair, has so far recovered that he was arraigned in the police court, to-day, to answer a charge of having attempted to end his life. He was accompanied by his friends, the Duke of Castelaccia and General Decanola. Bettini said he did not know what he was doing when he shot himself. He was held in bail to be on good behavior, which was furnished by friends.

Bound Over.

Memphis, 22.—General J. R. Chalmers, of Mississippi, arrived in this city this morning. Owing to rumors about the chief of police thought proper to arrest both he and McCalloway, of the Appeal. Before a magistrate they were made to give a bond of \$1,000 each to keep the peace.
