Belmont's Thoroughbreds. New York, 1.—At the annual sale of Belmont's thoroughbreds, "Lord Beaconsfield" foaled in '83, brought \$1,050; a bay colt, 1 year old, brought \$1,140.

Knott Ill. Louisville, 1.—J. Proctor Knott, democratic nominee for governor of Kentucky, is quite ill at this residence of Dr. Mather, of this city. His condition is not considered serious.

Big Guns. Boston, 1.—The South Boston Iron Works have made contracts with the war department, aggregating \$175,000, to construct four 12-inch rifle guns at \$30,000 each, one large mortar, and convert 50 10 inch smooth bores into 8-inch rifle cannon at an average cost of \$800.

Turbulent Irish. Dublin, 1.—Curran, divisional magistrate of the metropolitan police, Mallon, chief detective, and Juror Field have received letters threatening vengeance.

Amasa Stone's Bequests. Cleveland, 1.—Amasa Stone's will is not yet on record or obtainable, but trustworthy information is that he leaves \$60,000 to Adelbert College, making his contribution to that institution \$300,000. He leaves property valued at \$1,000,000 to his widow, and the remainder of his fortune variously estimated from \$6,000,000 to \$12,000,000 to his two daughters, Mrs. Col. Hay and Mrs. Samuel Mather, whose husbands are executors of the estate.

Cable Clunks. Toulon, 1.—The French transport, Myths, has sailed for Tonquin with 1,600 troops. Paris, 1.—Prince Jerome Napoleon has started for Chiselhurst to attend the Prince Imperial memorial mass.

Council Bluffs Deluged. Council Bluffs, Ia., 1.—This evening one of the worst storms that ever visited this vicinity, set in. Indian Creek, which runs through the heart of the city, overflowed. The damage is estimated at \$200,000. Seven iron bridges and two stone culverts belonging to the city were swept away; also several dwellings and barns. All the business houses on Main and Broadway streets were flooded and several losses of life are reported. Cries for help were heard in every direction, but the swiftness of the current rendered assistance impossible. The flood rose so quickly that many business men found it impossible to reach their wives and children.
