CITY COUNCIL. Proceedings at the City Council on Tuesday evening, June 12th, 1883, Mayor Jennings presiding: A petition from J. P. Olsen and thirty-two others, residents of the Second Ward was presented, asking the Council to reconsider its action of June 5th, 1883, in adopting a report of the committee on streets and alleys on a former petition of Second Ward residents asking that certain fences enclosing sidewalks be removed. The petitioners represented that the committee must have been misinformed as to the amount of travel on the streets in that vicinity, which was considerable, especially since the opening of Liberty Park. Laid over subject to call. A. M. Musser petitioned for the use of the waters flowing from a certain spring on the west side of Eighth East between Sixth and Seventh South streets, and the right to convey the same through pipes to his house in the First Ward. The petitioner represented that the granting of his petition would remove a certain quagmire on Eighth East street, which is filled with garbage and almost impassable. Referred to the committee on irrigation. A petition from Arthur Day and four others, asking that a certain canal between Chestnut and Pine streets six blocks north of South Temple street be filled up, to accelerate pedestrianism in that locality, was presented and the prayer granted. A petition from H. P. Trim complaining that the waters of the Jordan and Salt Lake City Canal had flooded his land in Sugar House Ward and damaged his corn, potatoes and hay land and asking that boxes be placed to drain off the water into Emigration creek was referred to the committee on construction of canal. A petition from Saml. Geo. Read, for the remittance of license to run a small news store near the D. & R. G. depot in consequence of adverse circumstances, was referred to the committee on license. Hyrum Worthington asked permission to erect a small stand for vending merchandise across the ditch on East Temple street, at the corner of First South Not granted. A petition was presented, signed by Z. Snow and twenty-three others representing that marble works were being established in City Creek canyon and the waters of City Creek diverted from their natural channel to supply motive power to operate said works and asking that the Council prohibit the establishment of any such mechanical works on the water channels belonging to the citizens of Salt Lake City, nor permit the waters thereof to be diverted from their legitimate uses for any purpose whatever. Referred to the committee on water works and public grounds, conjointly. A communication from the city surveyor was submitted stating that he had recently had applications for surveys in plat E, north of Apricot street and south of Peach street; and as the lots as now fenced and occupied, did not agree with the maps on record of said lots by 2-4-10 rods, as demonstrated by a map which accompanied his communication, the surveyor had declined to make surveys at present, much to the disappointment of property owners who were deterred in making improvements. The surveyor asked that some action be taken by the Council tending to rectify the error. Referred to the committee on streets and alleys. A statement of the condition of the artesian well on the northeast bench of the City, work upon which was recently ordered to be discontinued, was presented by Ephraim Bench, the gentleman in charge, which showed that at the end of the last week the well had attained a depth of 925 feet, 675 of which was in water. Some time ago an accident occurred which resulted in the pump getting fast. Exertions had been made to drill the same out, but without success. Referred to the committee on public works, with the Mayor and city engineer associated. The street supervisor submitted his report for the quarter ending May 31, 1883, showing a total cash expenditure of \$5,246.73, besides 786 1/2 days of prison labor at \$1 a day, which made the total expenditure on street improvement account \$6,113.23. Over \$1,800 had been expended in the purchase of gravel from cellars, etc. Referred to the committee on streets and alleys. The superintendent of waterworks reported for the quarter ending May 31, showing an expenditure of \$2,231.67 on waterworks account. Forty-one services had been furnished by the city to water takers, at a cost of \$1,012.64; four spills for filling sprinkling wagons had been erected at a cost of \$189. Referred to the committee on waterworks. Applications for license to do business as retail liquor dealers at their respective places of business for three months, were presented from Jacob Alt, Barnhardt & Stahl, Mrs. J. W. Butler, Barr & Smith, Causey & Fuge, Ewing & Fallon, N. P. Gray, Godbe, Pitts & Co., Bar ey C. Harvey, Hogle Bros., John Lollin, Jacob Leviberg, Geo. A. Meears, May & Gemmill, Marion Merrill, Ordner & Jones, Wm. A. Pitt, Augustus Podlech, J. E. S. Russell, Tufts & Nystrom, Chas. F. Webber, H. Wagener, and B. P. Whittemore. Granted, subject to the approval of the board required by law. Alderman Speirs presented the report of cases tried and disposed of and fines assessed and collected in

the police court for the month of May, 1883, showing in the aggregate: Number of cases tried, 138; number of cases dismissed, 38; fines assessed during the month, \$1,345.45; collected in cash for the month, \$467.90; collected in cash on old fines, \$67; total cash paid treasurer, \$339.90; labor fines for the month, \$837.55; total cash and labor fines, \$1,372.45; one case appealed, \$15; remitted, \$15; fines not paid, \$5. F. 1st. The committee on public grounds to whom was referred the bill of William Wheeler for pruning trees at the Warm Springs Bath House, reported that they had examined the terms of the lease under which James Townsend occupied said premises, and found that said lessee was required to keep all the buildings, baths, and all property therewith connected belonging to the city in good condition at his own expense reasonable use and inquiry by the elements excepted, which would include the proper care of the trees. The committee recommended that the bill be not allowed. Adopted. The committee on waterworks to whom was referred the petition of N. W. Clayton, F. H. Hyde and four others asking that the water mains be extended from East Temple to First West street on North Temple street a distance of two blocks, reported, recommending that the prayer of the petitioners be granted providing they would pay three-fourths the cost of the extension of the mains—the amount to be refunded in water licenses. The report stated that the condition of the city finances was such that it would not justify the extension of the water mains unless the applicants advance three-fourths cost. Adopted. The committee on water works to whom was referred the petition of S. E. Smith and Wm. N. Williams asking to have the water mains extended by the laying of a four inch pipe from the north side of South Temple street on West Temple, a distance of eighteen rods, reported that they had examined into the matter and found the extension asked for was too short to connect with any other main which was very necessary for the circulation of water, and the size of the pipe asked for was too small to agree with the plan of the waterworks. The committee therefore recommended that the prayer of the petitioners be not granted. Adopted. The committee on waterworks to whom was referred the petition of H. S. Eldridge and others asking an extension of time for using water from the mains to propel motors and other machinery, reported that after due consideration they found it would be an injustice to grant the motion, as the excessive use of waters through the water works so reduced the pressure in some of the pipes in the higher portions of the city that in certain localities the water at times ceased to flow, thus depriving those inhabitants from the use of the mains for which they advanced their money to extend, and who had no other source of water supply for domestic purposes. Besides this, the use of the waters through the motors caused an unequal, and consequently unjust, distribution of the irrigating water; and, moreover, the revenue received from the motors was more than expended by the city in keeping the streets and sidewalks clear from ice in winter, occasioned by the discharge of water from the motors. The committee therefore recommended that the prayer of the petitioners be not granted. Adopted. The committee on finance in compliance with instructions of May 20th, submitted an estimated statement of the probable receipts and requirements of the City for the current six months, which showed the liabilities of the City June 1st to be \$76,363.54. Probable receipts for six months \$76,688. Probable wants \$39,291.27. Filed. The following bills for the month ending May 31st, 1883, were presented for action, and allowed and the several amounts appropriated: Marshall's expense bills \$227.90; Salt Lake Power, Light and Heating Company for three electric lamps on North Temple street from May 12th, to June 12th, 1883, as per contract, \$30. Interest on note and overdraft at Deseret National Bank, \$43.00. Appropriations were made as follows: To the street supervisor's contingent fund, \$1,000; to the waterworks fund, \$500; to the watermaster's contingent fund, \$500. On motion of Councilor Clark, thirty copies of the bill for an ordinance relating to boarding houses and keepers thereof, were ordered printed in open lines for the use of the Council. Adjourned for one week.
