DORSEY DILATES.

He Attacks the "Reformers," but Does Not Defend Himself.

New York, 21.—The Sun prints a letter from ex-Senator Dorsey to his friends, in which he gives what he calls "a collected history of the efforts to destroy him." Dorsey says the original fight was wholly political. He writes: "The published correspondence between Garfield and myself shows the reasons for the animus of my enemies in his cabinet. You know with what scorn I treated the detestable idiosyncrasy of the suggestion that such men as McVeagh and James should be made cabinet ministers to represent republicans of those two great states, Pennsylvania and New York, neither one of whom could be elected magistrate in the smallest balliwick in his state. They cut no more figure in the politics of the nation than the remotest fixed star upon the movement of Saturn. I feared Grant and Conkling, and Arthur and all great leaders whom I believed to be upright, and in whom I believed the people of the country had confidence, were to be ignored, and that political fungus, pretenders, were to take the place of this sturdy class of experience and merit. General Garfield, in his amiability and kindness of heart, permitted McVeagh and James to read the correspondence which had passed between us, and he afterwards told me. McVeagh and James had scarcely warmed their official chairs before they began the persecution which has just come to an end, and which has long been detested by every fair and honest man in the country. Under a system of espionage before unknown to a free people, and unparalleled in any country, the infamy began. Nobody knew better than McVeagh and James that I had never made a penny out of the postoffice department, and that not a cent had been paid to me or to any one for me, out of the public treasury; but with power that none but those who have felt it can realize, the most miserable creatures that could be caught in a drag net snaked across the mouth of the vilest sewer were seized upon to rake and scrape the country to secure, if possible, something that might be turned into a charge against me. Two years of time and more than \$200,000 of the public money have been spent in an effort to wreak upon me the vengeance of ambitious and miserable camp followers.

The Turf

London, 21.—Racing at Stockbridge began today. The race for the Stockbridge cup, value 500 sovereigns, was won by P. Lorillard's "Irquois," nominated by the "Price of Wales" Prince Soltykoff's "Scobille" second; Sir F. Oshimind's "Magician" third; only three ran. The betting at the start was six to five on "Irquois," five to one against "Magician." "Irquois" won by three lengths.

The Beaufort handicap race, 200 sovereigns, added to sweepstakes of ten sovereigns each, was won by E. Godfrey's "Seahorse," F. Lorillard's "Seabrook" second, Deangus's "Parisian" third; eight starters.

The race for the Gladstone plate handicap, 100 guineas was won by P. Lorillard's "Arizona," J. A. Craven's "The Duke" second; T. Harding's "Wellington" third; ten starters. "Irquois" was ridden by Rossier, and "Magician" by Archer.

There was a good start, "Irquois" soon drew clear of "Magician," "Scobille" outside. At the half mile "Irquois" had increased the lead and won. "Magician" had third.

Charnel Houses.

Philadelphia, 21.—Portions of human remains found yesterday in a house formerly occupied by Dr. Hathaway were examined at the coroner's office by physicians, and the collection pronounced fetal bones. The coroner expressed the opinion that they were probably the remains of a dozen babies. The authorities will make examination of another dwelling on 60th street, recently occupied by the doctor, and it is thought it will be another charnel house. A search of the premises on Bristol avenue, near Fifteenth street, occupied by Dr. Hathaway at the time of his arrest, resulted in the discovery of a small leather satchel filled with pills containing liquids and powders. Surgical instruments were also found, which the doctor's wife (who lives in the house) said he used in his nervous practices. An account book was found which covered a period extending from May, '70, to July, '82, and containing the names and addresses of about 200 females, with the amounts for services written on the margin.

New York, 20.—Charles Backus, minister died this early morning.

The New Hampshire Senatorship Concord, N. H., 21.—The legislature took another ballot but there was no choice. Adjourned till Tuesday.

Dakota's Admission.

Huron, Dakota, 20.—The following resolution was adopted by the convention at a late hour last night: Be it resolved and enacted by the people of Dakota, through their delegates in convention assembled, that, for the purpose of enabling the people of that part of Dakota south of the 40th parallel to organize and form a state government and make application for admission into the union of states, a delegate convention is hereby called to meet on Tuesday, September 4th, 1883, for the purpose of framing a state constitution and doing and performing all other things essential to the preparation of the Territory for making application to the general government for the admission of such part of Dakota in the union of states.

Christians, 20.—The Storting rejected, by a vote of 80 to 32, the proposal to increase the allowances of the Crown Prince 50,000 kroner. The reason given by the opponents is the unsatisfactory political situation.

London, 21.—The steamer Nevada from Quebec for New York, has 671 Mormons; 500 Scandinavians, the remainder British.
