

LATEST TELEGRAMS

The Russian Fire.

St. Petersburg, 25.—Grigorieff's, warehouses, saw mills, most private houses, a steam flour mill belonging to the crown, chemical factory, bone mill, and cotton mill with three thousand bales of cotton are destroyed. Loss already 1,500,000 roubles.

New Steamers.

New York, 25.—The Red Star Line Steamship Company, plying between New York and Antwerp and Philadelphia and Antwerp, is building two new vessels, Western Land and Noerland, each 5,500 tons register, to accommodate the rapidly increasing passenger travel. These ships will equal, at least in speed and comfort, the best afloat. Their fleet now consists of eight vessels.

The Sergeant-at-Arms' Case—Indiana.

Washington, 25.—The case of Hallett Kilbourne, against ex-Sergeant-at-Arms Thompson, for arrest and imprisoning Kilbourne for refusing to produce his books before the committee investigating the real estate pool, was called in court to-day, and after argument was postponed until October 29. Following dispatch was received at the department of the interior to-day: WILCOX, A. T., June 25. Renegade Indians were forced on the reservation yesterday; will arrive at San Carlos Tuesday. Washington Wisp.

Washington, 25.—No change made in the collection districts of the city of New York, but on Long Island, eleventh district, and County Rockland, in twelfth district, are consolidated with the fourth district, and James W. Bentley designated as collector. This district will be known as the fifth district, and the collector probably have his headquarters in Albany. Oregon and Washington.—These two districts are consolidated, and John C. Cartwright appointed collector. The Yellow Fever.

Galveston, 25.—It now transpires that private advices of the terrible mortality at Vera Cruz from yellow fever were received in Galveston by cable, the best information obtained from the only entirely reliable party in constant telegraphic communication with Vera Cruz is to the effect that the first reports of Saturday are correct, and further communication from Galveston quarantine station, show ship Haytien, recently from Vera Cruz had no communication with any vessels in that port, besides the Lighter, this takes away the foundation from reports contradictory to the existence of the plague; besides the Haytien officers for quarantine reasons would be directly interested in suppressing any news of such an alarming nature.

A Dublin Fight.

Dublin, 25.—A terrible affray occurred at Curragh last evening, between a party of County Mayo militia and some English soldiers. Five were killed.

Later intelligence shows that the curragh affair was between north Mayo and Dublin militia men, not between the former and British troops. It originated in a gambling dispute during which Mayo called the Dublin men "Corcorans" and "invincibles." The fight lasted over an hour each side using stones and firearms freely and the conflict was only quelled by the officers threatening to fire upon the men. One of the men killed was a sergeant.

Monroe conservative, Pringle, liberal, and Healy, home ruler were nominated for parliament for the county. Parrell in an address at Monaghan told the crowd of people present if they desired another land bill they must return Healy to parliament.

A Great Theatre Fire.

Deerfoot 25.—The show was in a large hall over the tavern. There were ninety persons in the hall. A Bengal light was used, and presently fire and sparks from this set fire to a quantity of straw and greasewood in the adjacent room. On perceiving the flames the showman shouted "Fire," but the spectators thought the cry was merely a realistic detail of the show and remained seated. Cries of fire were soon raised outside the hall. The audience, thinking an affray had arisen in the street, barred with a heavy table the door leading from the hall. They did not discover their mistake until the flames burst in the room. After the fire was extinguished forty-seven charred corpses were found near the table, including the bodies of the showman and wife.

Foreign.

London, 25.—Mitchell, vice-consul, gives a reception on July 9th, to inaugurate the new officers of the United States consulate.

The land corporation of Ireland, for occupation and to purchase farms from which tenants have been evicted, met to-day. The chairman reported that the operations for the year had been beneficial, and that tenants were refraining and paying their rents; and a dividend of 5 per cent.

Monaghan, 1.—Parrell has gone to assist Healy.

Paris, 25.—A meeting of Irishmen here, the executions of the Phoenix Park murderers in Dublin was denounced as a massacre.

Paris, 25.—The municipally voted 10,000 francs to defray the expenses of the delegates from Paris to the forthcoming Boston exhibition.

The Jews.

London, 25.—Developments of further scandals at the trial at Nyrebeghazza, of the Jews charged with murdering a Christian girl, has given rise to the belief that the prosecution will be abandoned. Several Jewish witnesses for the defence claimed they had either been threatened at the preliminary inquiry, or statements they had never made were inserted in their depositions. It is elicited that the girl said to have been murdered, had quarrelled with her mistress shortly before she disappeared, and that the friends of the girl, when they missed her, had an idea she might have suicided. Employer of the sister of the dead girl, Esther Salomassy, testified he met Esther at home after the alleged murder.

Indians.

Washington, 25.—Upon receipt of this telegram Acting Secretary Joselin immediately brought it to the attention of Secretary Lincoln who assured him the agent must be in error as he had given positive orders to General Crook to keep the renegades apart from the other Indians. He added he would reiterate orders to General Crook as Wilcox is distant nearly 100 miles from San Carlos. It is believed at the Indian office that the agent had been misinformed.

Quarantine Raised.

Panama, 18.—Star and Herald: The quarantine regulations which were enforced at New Orleans against vessels from Aspinwall are effectually killing the trade between the two places, which was rapidly assuming large and promising proportions.

Brutal Spring.

Campero, 25.—Bolivian president punished Traizos, editor of Lapatria, who wrote articles on behalf of peace. Traizos was seized by the police and had his ears bored, and was then dressed in a suit of coarse cloth worn by Indians.

Exchanged Courtesies.

Huntsboro, Ala., 25.—Joseph Broom (white) expostulated with a negro for insulting his wife, and the negro stabbed him with a butcher's knife, with which he then killed her. Broom is supposed to be fatally wounded.
