An Impromptu Hanging Bee
Cairo, Ills., 6.—Arison Howard killed John Kain on an excursion train at Mound City. He was taken from Yuiaska county jail by thirty masked men, dragged fifty yards and suspended to the limb of a tree. He was shot two or three times before hung, and was dead when strung up. The body was entirely naked and left hanging. It is not known where the mob came from; some say they came by rail from Cairo. The mob broke into the Wabash tool house and took a heavy spike hammer. As they gathered around the jail the prisoners set up a fearful howl. The crowd rushed in and made Constable Date and the deputy sheriff prisoners, while the others covered Mr. Painter with revolvers, demanding the keys of the jail. He said the sheriff had the keys. The jail door was broken in, and Howard taken out. He fought desperately, but it was of no avail. Howard bore a bad reputation, while Kain was generally esteemed.

Lively Lightning.
Scranton, Pa., 6.—At Dickson City, a short distance from this city, Elias Roberts' house was struck by lightning, badly shattering it, and prostrating Roberts and two children, taking the shoe from the little daughter's foot. Roberts was unconscious for two hours, and his watch was ground to fine powder. The spire on Jermyn's coalbreaker was knocked off, several houses were struck, and many trees shattered along the river.

Gone to Prison
San Antonio, 6.—Major Wasson, defaulting paymaster, guarded by Lieutenant Bartlett and three non-commissioned officers, started this morning for Lansing, Michigan, penitentiary to serve out his eighteen months. He desired to publish a further statement, but permission was denied.

Archbishop Purcell's Funeral.
Cincinnati, O., 6.—A special train will convey the remains of Archbishop Purcell from Westboro to the city to morrow afternoon. Committees are at work perfecting the arrangements for the care of the body while lying in state, and for the funeral ceremonies on Wednesday next.

Yellow Fever.
New Orleans, 6.—The Times Democrat's Mobile special says: Last night news came that the bark Vega from Vera Cruz is anchored fifteen miles off Mobile bay, with Captain Hansen, mate and all the crew but four down with yellow fever. The bark has been ordered to the Ship Island quarantine.

Immense Immaculates.
Chicago, 6.—The supreme lodge of the Independent Order of Immaculates (color-d) adjourned this evening, after voting \$1,500 towards the Garfield University at Montgomery Ala. The next meeting will be held at Memphis, July, 1883.

The Evansville Fire.

Evansville, Minn., 6.—The loss is found much greater than at first estimated by the fire that broke out yesterday, at 11 a. m., in the rooms of the bank of Evansville, a frame structure two stories high. The fire apparatus was not obtainable and in all twenty-six buildings were burned. Loss \$150,000. The postoffice building is among the burned. Mails saved. Officials of the Manitoba Railroad ran a freight engine down from Alexandria with assistance. Their engine, lumber yard and elevator were saved. Insurance is thought will not amount to more than \$50,000. It is at present thought not necessary to issue an appeal for help; but so little is saved that this course may be necessary. Evansville contains about 6,000 inhabitants, is but four years old, and considerable business is done. The town is quite a wheat market, and contains three elevators.

Black Vomit—Quarantine.
Galveston, 6.—The man reported yesterday as ill on board the barque Solome, from Vera Cruz, has since died of black vomit. Another sailor on the same vessel is sick, undoubtedly from yellow fever, and is expected to die tonight. The Solome is thoroughly isolated from the rest of the shipping here. It is thought that the governor will take action to have her sent to the Ship Island. In addition to the state quarantine, the city has established a packet boat to patrol the water in the neighborhood of quarantined vessels. A cordon has also been established across to the east of Ship Island.

Woman's Suffrage in England.
London, 6.—The Commons, tonight, 130 to 114 rejected the motion made by Hugh Mason, liberal member for Ashton-under-Lyne, for female suffrage. The motion was supported by Leonard H. Courtney, financial secretary to the treasury, strongly opposed by Sir Henry James, attorney general. The privilege contemplated by Mason's motion was to be limited to women who, by virtue of property qualifications, already possess a municipal franchise. The motion was seconded by Baron De Worms, conservative member for Greenwich.

High License Talk.
St. Louis, 6.—The house delegated to-night passed an ordinance which was previously adopted by the council establishing the high license for "drum shops," in conformity with the state law passed by the legislature, last winter. It was expected the license for beer and wine saloons would be made uniform with "drum shops," but it was finally concluded to let them remain as heretofore, which is only about one quarter as high as the "drum shops."

Salvation for Sinners.
Houston, Texas, 6.—A negro named John Cone, for rapping a white woman named Mrs. Scott, in January, 1882, was hung in jail today, in the presence of 100 people, among whom were the husband and father of the outraged lady. Cone made a short speech on the scaffold, protesting his innocence and expressing a hope of salvation.

A Bold Thief.
St. Louis, 6.—John Gerheanser, messenger of the German Continental, this afternoon had a wallet containing \$20,000 and several checks wrenched from him after a desperate struggle. Gerheanser chased the thief three blocks but lost track of him in the crowd. The thief escaped.

Bishop Pinckney's Remains.
Washington, 6.—The remains of Bishop Pinckney were solemnly deposited in the Mortuary Chapel, Oakhill Cemetery, amidst solemn and impressive services. Sixty-three clergymen were present.

BRIEF TELEGRAMS.
A committee has been formed in Berlin to erect a monument to Martin Luther.
In Philadelphia there were six cases of sunstroke on Friday, five being fatal.
A cattle plague in Egypt has caused the death of ninety per cent of the cattle attacked.
Latest reports indicate the state of affairs slightly worse at Damietta, but improving at Mansurah.
Count Tatstler has bought 4000 (St. Petersburg) for 400,000 roubles. Kattkoff will probably be editor.
The statement, that the French flag has been hoisted on the New Hebrides Islands, is semi-officially denied.
London Times says: The shooting of the American team is excellent, but experts think the English will win on the long range.
A man named Cunningham, supposed to be an invincible, has been arrested at Ennis, charged with the shooting of Farmer Grifkey.
The striking iron-workers in England ceased their riotous proceedings when informed that the police were armed with cutlasses.
