TELEGRAPHIC

The Presidents Proposed Tour.

Chicago, 16.—Washington specials say that although there are very contradictory reports as to the presidents purpose, there is no possible doubt that he will make a trip to the Yellowstone. He is reported as having said to a friend that he had abandoned his Newport trip and his sea-bore fishing for this year, and intended to have a good time in the Yellowstone, "have," said the president, had enough of what is called society in winter in Washington. I want to get a hundred miles away from the nearest politician, where I can take a rest in my own way and be relieved from the social and political pressure that is so hard to avoid; then I have never seen that section of the country we are going to, nor do I know anything about the people who are the pioneers of civilization and keep on its utmost verge. I will have an opportunity to practically study the Indian question, which I have wished to do ever since I have been in office. General Sheridan has selected the best guides and scouts he can find to go with us on the trip, and we will see parts of country which as hitherto have been almost unknown to the white man. As to the spots of danger there may be, that only adds to the interest of the journey. I shall rough it just as the rest do, live and sleep in the open air, wear out my old hunting suit, and for the first time in my life become a savage. Such a trip will be worth more to me in instruction and health than twenty seasons in Newport or Saratoga would be.

Attorney-General Brewster expects to spend the rest of July and August at Newport; Secretary Lincoln will spend August in the Yellowstone country with the President; Secretary Folger intends to be at his home in New York; Postmaster-General Grosvenor will be absent from Washington in August; Secretary Teller has planned to spend August in Colorado; Mr. Chandler's intentions are not known; he may not then be a cabinet officer, but there is every prospect that the entire administration will be absent from Washington during August and the government will be run by assistant secretaries.

The anxiety of the President at being absent for so long a time from telegraphic communication has been relieved by an arrangement which will furnish daily line couriers from wherever of the presidential party goes to the nearest telegraph station, so that the president will be in daily communication with the executive office as well as he could be on a fishing excursion.

The Tamative Affair.

London, 16.—A dispatch from Sima says that the military authorities have been instructed to make inquiries in regard to the shipping available for transport service. Captain Hay, of the Taymouth Castle, on arrival at Natal, reported nothing relative to the alleged insult to the late British consul at Tamative. The captain of the British man of war, Dryad, was acting as consul; Captain Hay was allowed to see the captain of the Dryad at once. The French wished to have all consular dispatches sent aboard Admiral Pierre's ship, but the English objected and Captain Hay received them directly from the Dryad. The latter vessel scouted the Taymouth Castle out of the harbor.

A dispatch says the Protestant Church of Tamative, Madagascar. There is much misery among the British subjects at Tamative. The governor of Mauritius has sent a steamer to bring away refugees. The French admiral lowered the consular flag, and forbade their rehoisting until foreign representatives had been accredited. The captain of the English war vessel Dryad has offended the French by landing a guard of marines at the British consulate, and placing his boats at the disposal of fugitives. Dispatches from Tamative dated June 21, confirm the report of the arrest of English missionaries by the French. Three other English residents are placed under temporary arrest. Communication with the British man-of-war is forbidden. The French refugees from the capital, who it was feared were murdered, reached Tamative in safety, having been well treated in the interior.

Alexandria, 16.—Thirty-two deaths from cholera at Damietta yesterday, sixty-one at Mansurah, twenty-two at Samououd, and twenty at Mezoulah. The panic at Alexandria caused by the fear of cholera reaching here has been removed, and the people are leaving the city in large numbers. There are two cases of a disease supposed to be cholera, at Bulak; six deaths from cholera have occurred at Wages.
