A SAD FATALITY.

A Young Woman Accidently Shot at Provo.

Provo city was the scene on Monday night of a saddening accident, similar in its character to that which took place here some weeks ago, resulting in the death of R. W. S. Andrew. St. Alfred is the night watchman at the Denver and Rio Grande depot. On Monday night about 8 o'clock he discovered a couple of tramps hanging around and arrested them. He had started to the jail with them when one broke away and ran, and as Mr. Alfred could not give chase without letting the other escape, he could only warn the runaway to halt. This he did three or four times, but the runaway refused to stop. Thinking it frightened him to compliance, Mr. Alfred pulled his pistol and fired into the ground. At this time Mrs. Orin Lewis was stepping out of her front door, in the vicinity, and was going to choir practice with a lady, and was, at the moment Mr. Alfred fired, in the act of fastening the front door, her body being turned sideways. She was about twenty rods away. The ball must have struck a rock, for it deflected, and struck Mrs. Lewis in the right side of the abdomen, ranging upward. She was immediately carried into her house and Dr. Pike of this city telegraphed for the doctor left by the D. and R. G. and reached Provo at a little past 1 o'clock Tuesday morning, but immediately upon seeing the poor lady realized that her case was absolutely hopeless. She breathed her last at 5:10 Tuesday morning of hemorrhage.

She was a daughter of Mr. Gillespie, who works at the church quarry, at Granite—who lost a son about a year ago by the terrible accident in the Wyoming coal mine. She was about 23 years of age, and had been married only eighteen days. She was highly respected and her painful death has cast a gloom over the whole city of Provo. It was a casualty which it was impossible to have foreseen, notwithstanding which Mr. Alfred is almost beside himself with grief.

Gaming Extraordinary.

A party of young men of this city, inflated with the tales of Nimrods and ramrods that have been peddled around so freely, the other day decided on testing for themselves what there was in the sporting boom. They betook themselves to a point near the mouth of Jordan and spent the first night amid nature's wastes, with brushes for their sentinels and mosquitoes for their guardian angels. The next morning at 3 o'clock they were up and off for the duck pastures, tramping over all kinds of soil and through varying species of undergrowth, in order to be at the rendezvous of the feathered tribe when the latter began their toilet. Daylight came at last, and that was all that did come. Now and then a sad and lonely little thing with wings and feathers could be seen half a mile away, a wayfare through the great aerial highway, whose loneliness and sadness would have protected it anywhere.
