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PROTECTION OF COAL MINERS.

The bill introduced in the House last month, by Mr. Boyden, of Summit, "providing for the health and safety of persons employed in coal mines," and which has just been reported back to the House favorably from the committee on mines and mining, strikes us as a measure that should be passed by the assembly and become law.

The coal mining industry is assuming very large proportions in this Territory. There are not less than 5,000 men working in the mines, and the number is annually increasing. These men are entitled to all the protection that the law can throw around them.

NEW MEXICO'S DELEGATE.

The national House of Representatives has just unseated the Hon. Tranquillo Luna (Republican), Delegate from New Mexico, and given the seat to another Mexican, Manganares, who is a Democrat. The certificate of election was given to Mr. Luna upon his showing of 15,062 votes against 13,376 for his opponent.

INTERNATIONAL COPYRIGHT.

The other morning reference was made in these columns to a letter written by Mr. Henry C. Lea, regarding the proposed international copyright. It was then stated that such copyright was not in the interest of the reading public nor of the pockets of the masses.

It will thus be seen that international copyright would be a heavy tax upon the reading public. At the same time, the fact is not altered that an international law which would protect the rights of authors in all countries where their books may be read would only be fair and just.


MONTANA MATTERS.
