The Spark Arresters.

SALT LAKE CITY, May 20, 1884.

Editors Herald:

Your correspondent of this morning seems rather hard on the "spark arresters." After saying that "they look fine, quite an ornament," etc., he says "the chimney stacks are no better with them than without them." Now, if "a thing of beauty is a joy forever," as somebody has said, should not friend Rowe be congratulated on having the most handsomely finished smoke stack on the block? And in order to satisfy all demands I would suggest that before the scaffold is taken down, he have the discs removed, as they may in time spoil the draught, while the ornamental part will still remain, and they will probably be just as useful as spark arresters as they are now.

Really the fault is not in the officer who is endeavoring to carry out the provisions of the ordinances, but in the ordinances, which need revision. There seems to have been a falling in times past, that when a subject needed legislation, no matter of how technical a character it might be, the city officials seemed to consider themselves fully competent to grapple with the problem. Of late years they seem to have realized that legal advice and assistance were necessary, and the same thing ought to follow in relation to other things.

There was at one time a provision in the ordinances that foundry furnaces should have a wire netting over the stack. It is just possible that such a net might last for one hour while a heat was being taken off, but it is extremely doubtful, and as the furnaces use nothing but the hardest coke, the usefulness of the demand is apparent.

About a year ago the attention of the City Council of Philadelphia was called to the inconsistencies of their ordinances in relation to steam boilers and furnaces. The Mayor was authorized to nominate a committee of engineers to consider the subject and draft an ordinance, which he did, and appointed a committee of five, who, after carefully considering the subject, made their report, which was considered satisfactory, and the changes were made. I am pleased to see that parties "Not Engineers" can see through a mill stone—I should say a chimney stack—as well as engineers, but I always found it easier to see through a mill stone when there was a hole in it. Proposals for Indian Supplies and Transportation.

DEPARTMENT OF THE INTERIOR, Office of Indian Affairs, Washington, April 23, 1884.—Sealed proposals, indorsed "Proposals for Beef," (bids for Beef must be submitted in separate envelopes,) Bacon, Flour, Clothing, or Transportation, &c., (as the case may be,) and directed to the Commissioner of Indian Affairs, Nos. 65 and 67 Wooster Street, New York, will be received until 1 p. m. of Tuesday, May 27, 1884, for furnishing for the Indian service about 520,000 pounds Bacon, 88,000,000 pounds Beef on the hoof, 200,000 pounds Beans, 45,000 pounds Baking Powder, 780,000 pounds Corn, 450,000 Coffee, 7,500,000 pounds Flour, 70,000 pounds Feed, 195,000 pounds Hard Bread, 43,000 pounds Hominy, 18,000 pounds Lard, 700 barrels Mess Pork, 180,000 pounds Rice, 7,500 pounds Tea, 500 pounds Tobacco, 220,000 pounds Salt, 150,000 pounds Soap, 6,000 pounds Soda, 550,000 pounds Sugar, and 40,000 pounds Wheat.
