

ARIZONA.

The Beauties and Advantages of Graham County.

CENTRAL SMITHVILLE,
Graham County, Arizona,
May 15th 1884.

Editors Herald:

In reading through the columns of your valuable paper, I notice there are a great number of families now en route for this county from Utah. I wish to say to all who are desirous of making themselves comfortable homes and beautiful farms, to come to the so called Sunset Land. Well does Arizona deserve this name. There is no portion of the Union that can show so many cloudless days as Arizona, and when the last ray of the sun has disappeared, there is presented a picture to which neither pen nor pencil can do justice. No artist has yet undertaken to paint an Arizona sunset, but for him who can transfer to canvas its wonderful colors, and its inexpressible grandeur, there is both fame and fortune in store. In my opinion, it would pay Mr. Armitage, who is an artist in Salt Lake City, to pay us a visit. The winter climate in this part of Arizona is indeed as near perfection as one can expect to find anywhere on the globe. The emigrant, who thinks of casting his lot in this growing Territory, need not have any misgivings about the climate. Under its genial skies he can follow his calling in the open air every month in the year. Such a land is Arizona, endowed by nature with every gift to make a powerful, prosperous and happy State, and blessed with a climate unsurpassed in either hemisphere. The climate is suitable to all constitutions, and if people are temperate and industrious they can meet and overcome the obstacles of new surrounding, and in a few years gain the goal of independence. The cost of the necessaries of life here are very reasonable, yet notwithstanding the cost of freight, prices are as low as in Utah, excepting for flour, which is now \$5 per 100 pounds. We have in Smithville two large stores, one owned by Mr. Webb, who I believe does more business than any other mercantile house in the county. I called in Mr. Webb's store the other day and found him filling an order which he had just received from Bowie, in Cochise County, which is fifty miles from Smithville. Bowie is one of the largest depots on the Atlantic & Pacific Railroad in Arizona. The other store is known as the Smithville Co-op. (It is the oldest established store in Smithville.) This store does a fair amount of business. The Pioneer steam saw mill is now in good running order, and is capable of sawing 10,000 feet of lumber per day, but at present is only turning out about 5,000 feet per day. The planing machine has now been attached to the engine, and in the course of a few days will be working order. Besides this, the mill will saw shingles. Adjoining the Co-op. store is the lumber yard of this mill, which is managed by Mr. H. Welch. With the management of the store and the lumber yard Mr. Welch is kept busy. We have two lumber yards here. The other one joins Mr. Webb's store, which is under the management of Mr. Webb for Mr. Fry, who has a small steam saw mill about twelve miles from here. Now that we have these two saw mills here the poorer classes can build for themselves comfortable dwelling houses. Smithville and Central are now beginning to look like eastern cities. The county schoolhouse in Smithville is near completion. Those who are desirous of seeking new homes I would advise to come to Graham County, and those who wish to know further about this country can write to me at the above address.

Smithville also has a dramatic association, under the management of Joseph Foster. They played in the large hall owned by Moses Cluff, "The Rose of Ettrick Vale," on the night of May Day. The actors were Joseph Foster, Peter McBride, Moses Cluff, Mr. Crookston and G. Wheatley, and Miss Nettie Ferren. The house was crowded.

A few of the farmers here will commence cutting their grain on or about the 20th of this month. Peas are ripe, and all vegetables and fruits are fast maturing. The people of Central and Smithville are all feeling well and enjoying good health. **GEORGE WHEATLEY.**
